Condy Pugh Leads Kittens Past Eagles in Final, 18-13

A late Eagle rally brought Hearne within five points of A&M Consolidated gridgers in an 18-13 win for the alert Kittens. The win was the outcome of an 18-0 half-time lead for Consolidated's hopped-up eleven.

Condy Pugh started scoring for the Consolidated team with a 22-yard run around left end. In the

second quarter Russell Welch fired a pass to Bobby Adams for a 29 yard scoring sprint and in the third period Johnny Williams went five yards off right tackle for the final marker.

Fine defensive playing for the Kittens was turned in by Bob White, Charles Roeber, and Howard Mayhew.

65,000 Crowd Expected Tomorrow in Cotton Bowl

With the National Collegiate Athletic Association taking up A&M's probation next Tuesday, the Aggies are thinking of first matters first—that is Saturday's grid game with SMU in Dallas.

A predicted crowd of 65,000 fans will almost fill the Cotton Bowl to watch the battle of undefeated Southwest Conference teams. A&M holds victories over TCU, Baylor and Arkansas, while the Mustangs have slipped past Rice and Texas, both by a point.

SMU puts its hopes on a pair of fine backs—Quarterback Charley

Arnold and Halfback Charlie Jackson. Arnold has passed for eight touchdowns already this season while Jackson is the break-away type of runner who might score on any play.

The Aggies will counter with a pair of potential all-Americans—Fullback Jack Pardee and Halfback John Crow. Crow tops the SWC in scoring with 42 points on seven touchdowns and has been named "Back of the Week" twice. Pardee is fifth in the league in rushing with 393 yards and has already established himself as the nation's finest linebacker.

A&M's Roddy Osborne, the con-

ference's runningest quarterback pits his ground game against the aerial attack of Arnold. Osborne has picked up 407 yards, third high in the SWC.

The Aggies are heavy favorites to win this one and go on to their eighth conference championship, their first since 1941. In 1955 the Cadets of Paul (Bear) Bryant beat a ponderous Pony team, 13-2, on Kyle Field. A&M holds a close 18-15-5 lead in the long series.

SMU, the first team in '56 to beat Notre Dame, owns a 4-2 record while the fifth-ranked Aggies are 6-0-1, their only scar a 14-14 tie with the University of Houston.

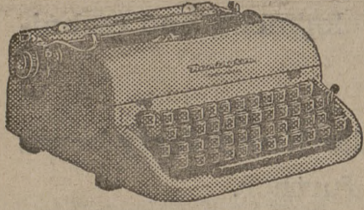
