

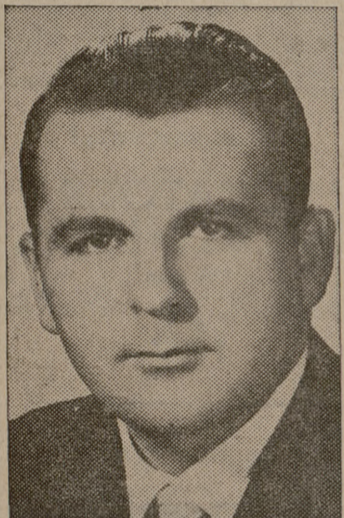
'Africa In Movie'

Shown in the interesting films were a parade in Luanda, capital of the Portuguese West African province of Angola; inland coffee plantations, and the beautiful forests, rivers, waterfalls and wild animals of the Belgian Congo.
