



## Sen. Douglas Here For Great Issues

Sen. Paul H. Douglas, of Illinois, is next on the roster of Great Issues speakers and is to speak here Friday, Feb. 8, in the MSC Birch Room.

Sponsored by the Great Issues Committee of the Memorial Student Center, the former economics professor and well-known author will speak on "Our Trouble Spots." At 8 p. m., Don Williams, chairman of the MSC committee will introduce Douglas who will then take the stand for the evening's talk.

Following his graduation from Bowdoin College in 1913, Douglas took his graduate work at Harvard and Columbia Universities and was awarded his Ph. D. from the latter. He became a professor of Economics at the University of Chicago in 1925.

In 1942 at the age of 50, he enlisted in the Marine Corps as a private. Before he retired from the service in 1946, he had attained the

rank of lieutenant colonel. He served in the First Marine Division and was awarded the Bronze Star (See SEN. DOUGLAS, Page 6)
