Twelve square blocks, including the 13-story Mapes Hotel and the Masonic temple, were evacuated for fear of further explosions from pockets of the artificial gas (propane-air).

Although witnesses told of seeing bodies all over the street with "many" dead, only two bodies had been found by nightfall, five hours after the blast.

They were the bodies of Mrs. John DuPratt, about 60, member of a socially prominent Reno family who was walking along the street at the scene, and Frank Spina, part owner of a cobbler shop in the destroyed block. Spina's crushed body was found un-der a wrecked car at the curb.
