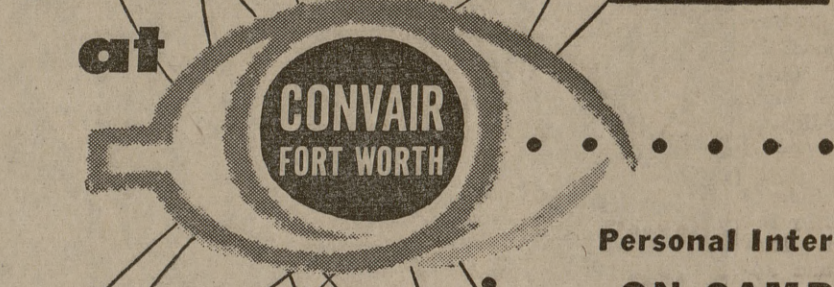
As a result of the accident Hemsley suffered from a sprained ankle and minor scratches and
