## **Prime Minister Remarks Run Different Ways**

WASHINGTON, (AP)-Sec retary of State Dulles and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan are talking out of different sides of their

They are doing so in interpreting the achievements of the Eisenhower-Macmillan conference at Bermuda with respect to future cooperation between Britain and the United States in the Middle East.

They apparently are placing a different emphasis on the importance of the Bermuda talks. Moreover, Dulles came very close yesterday to contradicting what Macmillan had said publicly at Bermuda on Sunday.

The reason for the differences seems to be that the British government has an interest in demonstrating the return of almost total harmony between London and Washington. But the United States government is trying to maintain its influence with the Arab states as well as Israel while becoming much more friendly with Britain again. Hence it does not want to show too close an understanding with the British on all points.

This is the kind of diplomatic game which could lead to serious misunderstanding between London and Washington by confusing the issue although officials on all sides obviously hope it will stop short of test. that point.
