# Lutherans Plan District Meet For Next Week

Thirty-fifth delegate convention of the Texas District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod will be held Monday through Friday of next week at Lutheran Concordia College in Austin.

Representing Bethel Lutheran Church of Bryan will be the Rev. William C. Petersen and Robert Farley.

Main attraction of the convention will be a discussion essay on "The Sermon in Christian Worship," conducted by Dr. Mark J. Steege of Springfield, Ill. Dr. Steege has been on the faculty of Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield since 1947.

Delegates at the convention will represent 62,000 members in 245 churches and preaching stations in Texas.
