

Tracksters Battle Rice, Baylor Here Friday

A&M's thinyclads hope to get back on the victory trail at the expense of Rice and Baylor tomorrow at 3 p. m. on the cinder oval around Kyle Field.

The Aggies of Coach Frank G. (Colonel Andy) Anderson will be at home for the final time of the 1957 season and Andy's final appearance as A&M track coach. Anderson retires at the end of the current season.

The Maroon finished a dismal

last in a meet with the University of Southern California, the University of Texas, Abilene Christian College and SMU last week in Dallas. USC and Texas, probably the two finest track teams in the nation, ended 1-2.

Pole vaulter Winton Thomas was defeated for the first time in 1957, losing to a California vaulter as the Aggies managed only 12 points. The Aggies haven't met Baylor in anything except the huge Border

Olympics yet this season, but have tangled with the Owls three times, emerging triumphant in each case.

"This will be another close meet," said Colonel Andy. "The Owls are always tough, but we don't know much about Baylor. They're not as good as they were last year."

For the first time in six weeks, the Aggies may have the services of ace hurdler, Emmett Smallwood, who pulled a muscle early in the season and has been healing slowly, but his value is limited.

Both the Bears and Rice have good mile relay teams and the battle for the four-lap relay should be another good one. The Aggies have defeated the Owls on two occasions on the strength of mile relay victories.

Baylor's points will come from a trio of quartermilers, Vic Davis, J. B. Mitchell and Allen Mayne, a good 440-yard relay team and broadjumper — sprinter Merton Fuquay.

NEW YORK (AP)—Harold and Olga Connolly, two Olympic champions whose romance defied Iron Curtain barriers, arrived Wednesday with 35 cents between them and plans for carrying on their brilliant athletic careers under different flags.

The obvious question was: Will Olga throw the discus for her native Czechoslovakia or for Uncle Sam in the 1960 Games at Rome?

"For Czechoslovakia," firmly said the former Olga Fikotova, a vivacious, trimly-built medical student from Prague who set an Olympic women's record at Melbourne last November when she tossed the discus 176 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

"I promised before I left home that I would keep my Czech citizenship and represent my country in all international events," she

Six Bidding For Derby Posts Today

LEXINGTON, Ky., (AP)—Round Table faces the challenge of five Kentucky Derby nominees today in the \$25,000 added Blue Grass Stakes as the colts bid for a ticket to Derbytown.

The Oklahoma — owned, Kentucky-bred son of Princequillo will carry 126 pounds in the 1 1/2 mile warmup, the same weight he'll tote in the Derby at Louisville a week from Saturday.

Blue Grass allowance conditions give each of his rivals—Lucky Dip, Shan Pjc. Manteau, One-Eyed King and Breezy Night —121 pounds as nonwinners of a stakes.

If all starts, the Blue Grass will gross \$31,000 with the winner banking \$19,600. Post time is 4:30 p. m. CST.

"I would like it that way—it would be good for relations between the two countries," said Harold, a six-foot-two, 220-pound Boston school teacher who won the gold medal in the Olympic hammer throw with a feat of 207 feet, 3 1/2 inches.

Dan Ferris, executive secretary of the U. S. Amateur Athletic Union who joined in a City Hall reception, said:

"Under a new Olympic rule, the wife of an American may compete on the U. S. team even though she may have represented another country in previous games. Olga has four years to make up her mind."

Harold and Olga first met two years ago when Harold visited Prague on a European exhibition tour with another weight-thrower, Bob Backus. The friendship was renewed in the Olympic Village at Melbourne last November.

In March Harold went to Czechoslovakia as a U. S. goodwill ambassador, and asked Olga to be his bride but was ordered out of the country before he could get government sanction. He waited in Germany, repeated his requests and finally on March 21 got an okay from the Russian satellite country which frowns on mixed East-West marriages. They were wed March 27.

A&M Students Eligible to Join Brazos Golfers

The newly-formed Brazos Golf Association, which was organized Tuesday, opens its first tournament, the Brazos Golf Association Championships, with qualifying rounds beginning yesterday.

As many 16-player flights as needed will be formed with winners receiving \$15 in gift certificates and runners-up \$10. The tourney champion will receive a perpetual trophy donated by Henry Ransom.

The association will be a member of the Texas and United States Golf Associations and has been formed primarily to promote interest in golf in Brazos County.
