Auburn Vet Prof Lectures Today

Dr. B. F. Hoerlein, Professor of Small Animal Surgery and Medicine, Auburn, Alabama, will discuss recent developments in surgical correction of intervertebral disc protrusions in the dog for Texas veterinarians at the Texas conference for Veterinarians here today and tomorrow.

A pioneer in the field of canine neuro-surgery, Dr. Hoerlein is recognized nationally and internationally for his research work at Cornell University where he completed his Ph. D. in Veterinary Surgery in 1952.

He completed his work for a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree at Colorado State College in 1943 and served with the U. S. Army Veterinary Corps for 3 years.
