

## Water Meeting Draws 150 Men to Campus

A statewide conference covering phases of Texas water problems is being held in the Memorial Student Center and will continue through Wednesday.

Approximately 150 hydrologists, meteorologists, reservoir engineers, agriculturalists and municipal and industrial water plant operators are expected for the conference, the third of its kind held at A&M.

Principal speaker for the conference will be Howard Tellepsen, owner of a construction company in Houston, who will speak on "The Role of Water Supply in the Industrial Growth of Texas." He will replace Gov. Price Daniel, who was formerly scheduled to speak but was unable to attend the conference.

Delegates will also hear discussion of surface and subsurface reservoirs, stream flows and floods, factors in evaporation, biological aspects of evaporation control, demineralization of brackish waters, as well as a number of addresses on other phases of overall state water problems. Another highlight of the program will be a paper on the mechanism of rain making by Dr. I. T. Krick from California Technical Institute.

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## Students Pay Buck For Rubber Checks

Starting September 1, 1957 when a department of the college receives a check returned unpaid by the bank from which it is drawn, the person presenting it will be required to pay a penalty of \$1.

Notices to students on returned checks will be sent via the dorm counselor or tactical officer, who will retain a copy of the note, and will have authority to bring disciplinary action through the Office of Student Affairs or Commandant's Office when deemed necessary. Such action could possibly result in the student being dismissed from A&M if the case warrants.

All students are urged to maintain accurate records of their bank accounts to avoid having checks returned.

## A&M Mom's Club Number Changes

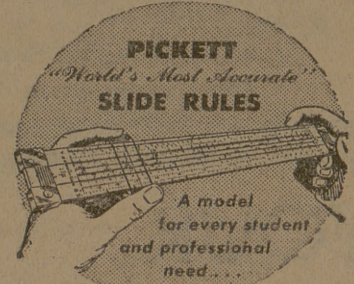
San Antonio Aggies desiring rides back to A&M should contact Mrs. Marville Gill, chairman of the San Antonio mothers club's transportation committee.

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## Gas Tax Claims Must Be Filed In September

Claims for Federal Gas Tax Refunds for nonhighway and transit users are due to be filed no later than Sept. 30, cautions R. L. Phinney, Internal Revenue Service district director.

These claims cover the fiscal period from July 1956 to June 1957 and are computed at the rate of one cent per gallon on gasoline used otherwise than as fuel in a highway vehicle, such as motorboats, aircraft, bulldozers and stationary engines.

Information needed for the gas tax refund can be obtained by writing Phinney for publication 378. Claims should be made on form 843.

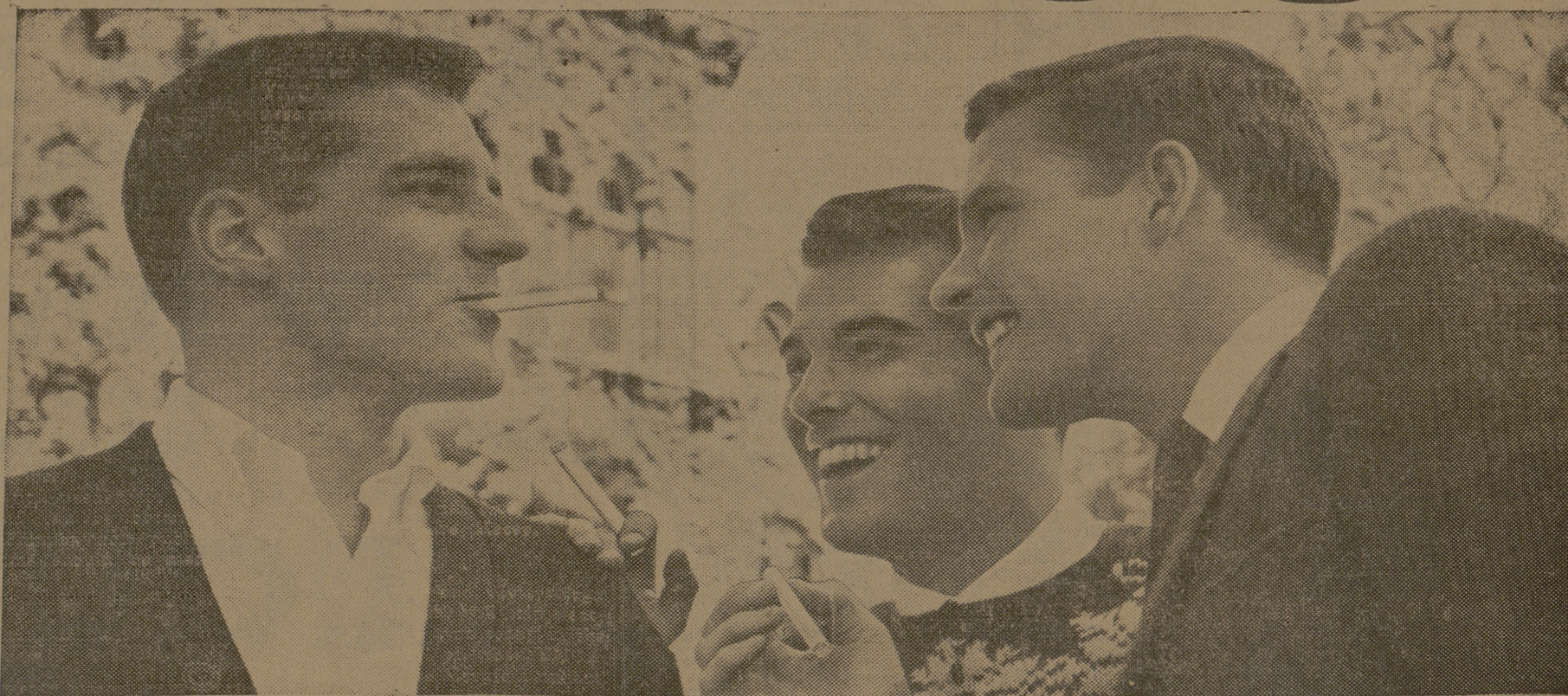

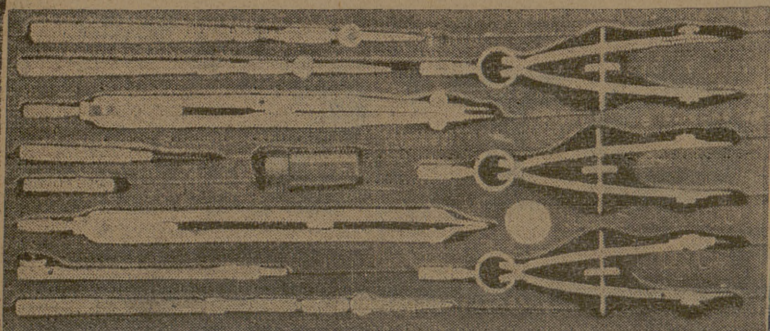
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
