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State Ranchers Discuss Profits At Cattle Meet

Cattlemen from all parts of Texas and neighboring states met yesterday and today at A&M to discuss the profit-making part of their business and to attend a directors meeting of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

During the cattlemen's two days on campus they heard discussions by A&M System staff members on all major phases of beef production which bear on profitable operation and conducted an association business meeting.

Yesterday morning they were shown a group of animals on-the-hoof and asked to judge them for carcass quality characteristics. These animals were slaughtered, graded and the carcasses evaluated while members attended lectures on the importance of reproductive performance in cattle; nutrition factors affecting profitable production and the part parasites play in the production picture and marketing methods research, both at stockyards and in the kitchen.

A program for the members' wives was arranged that included an informal dinner, research of interest to women, a coffee at the home of President and Mrs. M. T. Harrington, and lunch with the A&M Corps of Cadets.

A&M Employees To Get Holidays

The 10 legal holidays plus a three-week vacation for full-time, twelve month employees of the state will also apply to A&M's employees, said Charles Roeber, business manager of the college.

The holidays are provided for in House Bill No. 133 of the 55th Texas Legislature.

In addition, A&M employees will be able to contribute up to \$504 per year instead of the present \$180 per year to their retirement program if the Employees Retirement System bill passes in the Constitutional Amendments election Nov. 5.

J.C. Conference Begins Sunday

Registration for the Fourteenth Annual Junior College Conference will be held in the M.S.C. lobby beginning Sunday afternoon, September 29. A registration fee of \$2 will be charged for the conference, which will try to coordinate junior and senior college programs in the first two years of college.

The conference will adjourn at noon Tuesday, Oct. 1, and all conference members wishing to attend the informal luncheon session scheduled for noon Monday may purchase tickets when they register.

The Monday morning session will begin with an address by Dr. Ralph Green, Director, Texas Commission on Higher Education. The afternoon session will deal with problems relating to integrating junior and senior college curricula pertaining to the area of B.A., with T. W. Leland presiding.

Closed circuit television and its implications for college instruction will be Tuesday morning's main topic, with Walter Rundell, Dean of Lee College, Baytown, presiding. A demonstration of teaching methods and techniques related to television instruction, using cameras, lights, monitors and viewing monitors whereby the conference participants may view the whole set-up from the stage and through sets will be held.

Texas police trainees, meeting in the Memorial Student Center for the Texas Municipal Police School, Thursday received training in the investigation of auto theft and other crimes involving motor vehicles.

Instructor was C. C. Benson from the National Auto Theft Bureau's Dallas office. Benson instructed the trainees on how to interrogate auto theft suspects and investigate automobile fires.

At a session Friday from 9 to 12 the students were instructed on how to detect counterfeit money and to apprehend counterfeiters. Forest V. Sorrel, a member of the United States Secret Service was the instructor.

Area Employment Down In August
