Rehearsals Begin For Aggie Actors

The Aggie Players take the first step in the five-month rehearsal schedule for Shakespeare's Macbeth at 7:30 p. m. tonight in the Music Hall, director C. K. Esten has announced.

"This first meeting is 'command attendance' for all members of the Aggie Players," Esten remarked. "We would also like to have anyone else in the community even remotely interested in any part of the production present."

Tonight's meeting will include a discussion by Esten and Dr. Sam Southwell, who since mid-summer has been writing the script for the production, the basic elements of the play and the particular approaches being made by the Players.

"Some readings will be included in the agenda of the meeting," said Esten. "I would urge everyone who will attend the meeting to read or re-read the play before then."

The production will be the largest the Players have done in many years, Esten said. There will be 28 actors and a number of bit players at its showing on a special stage in the Memorial Student Center Ballroom during February.

Others working on the play include Mary Southwell, who is designing the costumes, Eugenia Harris, in charge of making the costumes, and Allen Schrader, an English instructor who has written special music for the production.

The meeting ends Friday. The state-wide meeting will cover research needs of the future and research underway at College Station and 44 other locations over the state, according to Director R. D. Lewis.

Several discussions on results of research will be held.

The welcoming address will be given by D. W. Williams, vice president for agriculture. Out-of-state speakers include W. C. Shaw, Agricultural Research Service, U.S.D.A.; Harrell DeGraff, Babcock professor of Food Economics, Graduate School of Nutrition, Cornell University; K. S. Quisenberry, assistant administrator, Production Research Division, ARS, USDA; and E. F. Knippling, director, Entomology Research Division, ARS, USDA.

Sessions will be held each morning and afternoon. The annual banquet will be held Wednesday night.
