Brady Armstrong, senior from Shreveport, was elected president of the Society of American Military Engineers last week at the group's first meeting of the year.

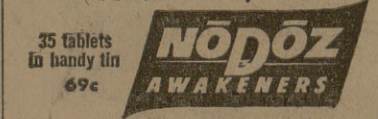

A change in motor vehicle inspection regulations, which will out the requirement of having to remove a wheel in order to inspect the brakes, was announced this week by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Potts is a junior agronomy major at A&M.

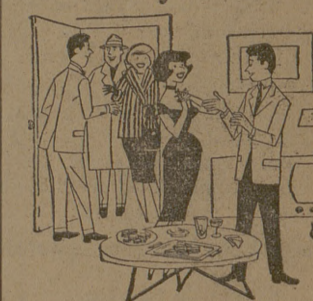
Halloween Dance Set Tonite by Class
