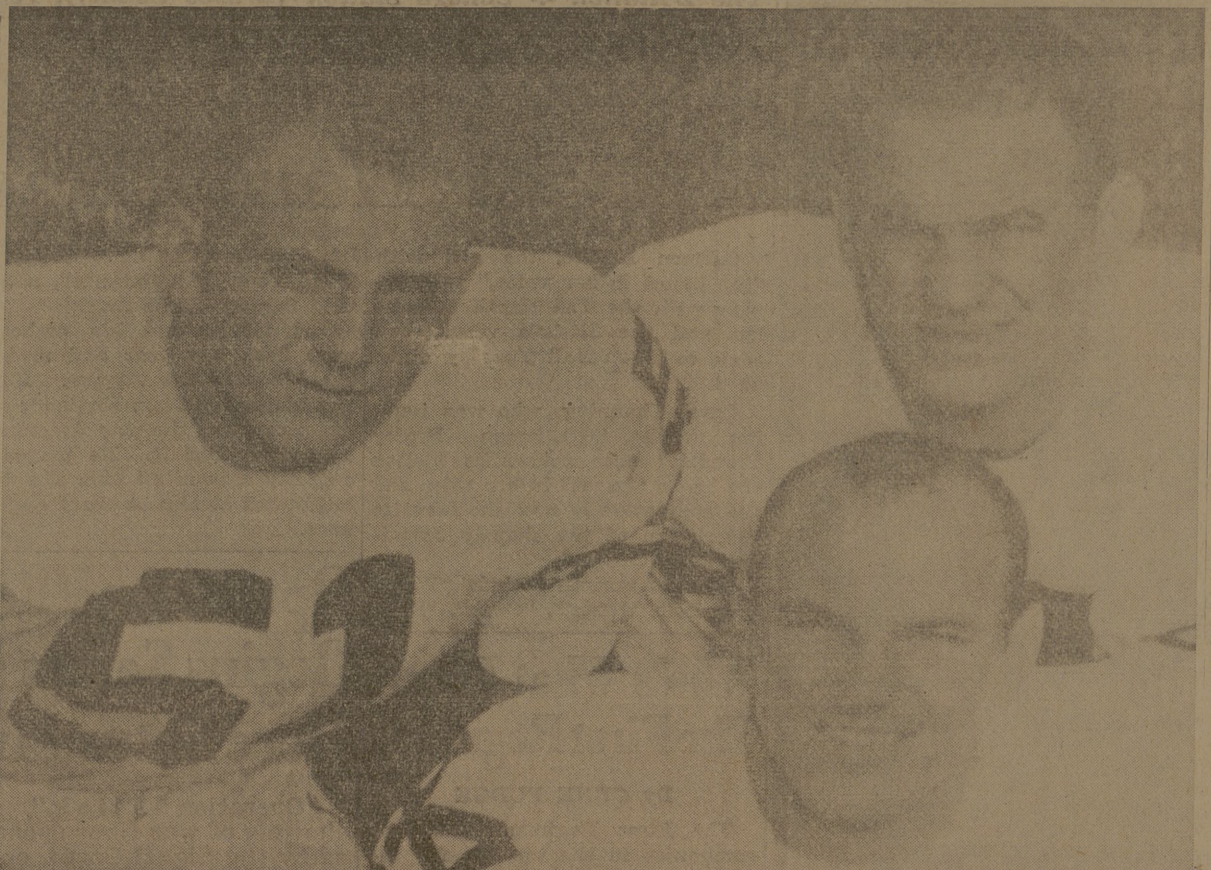

### University of Arkansas

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark., Oct. 30 (AP)—Influenza struck again at the University of Arkansas football team today, with starting tackle Richard Bennett, second-string guard Billy Michael and third-string end Jim Gaston showing symptoms.

Halfback Billy Kyser and end Billy Truman, both from the Porker second unit, came down with flu yesterday.

The news put fresh creases into the brow of youthful Razorback Coach Jack Mitchell, who is getting his team ready for Saturday's invasion by Texas A&M, the No. 1 team in the nation in the latest Associated Press poll.

### Texas Tech

STILLWATER, Okla., Oct. 30 (AP)—Fullback Larry Rundle was in "apparently good shape" today and will see action in Oklahoma State's homecoming game here Saturday against Texas Tech, Coach Cliff Speegle said today.

Rundle has been hampered the past few weeks by a foot injury. Speegle said he may see only "spot duty" against Texas Tech since he has missed so much practice.

The Cowboys, who were idle last week, completed their heavy work today for the Tech game.

### Baylor

WACO, Tex., Oct. 30 (AP)—The Baylor Bears continued their emphasis on offense today as they attempted to sharpen their in-and-out attack for their homecoming battle next Saturday against the TCU Horned Frogs.

In their final lengthy practice sessions of the week, the Bears spent a long time on group work in efforts to polish individual assignments, with nearly all drills calling for sustained contact.

### Texas Christian University

FORT WORTH, Oct. 28 (AP)—TCU Horned Frogs divided time in today's drills between offense and defense in preparation for Saturday's game with the Baylor Bears at Waco. Emphasis was placed on both pass offense and defense.

Coach Abe Martin said the frogs would be in near top shape for the contest.

### University of Texas

AUSTIN, Oct. 30 (AP)—Darrell Royal, University of Texas football coach, said today SMU "is every bit as capable of winning as we are" and predicted a "nip and tuck" game with the Mustangs Saturday.

"They're tougher boys physically than the ones we played last week. If you don't win physically, you don't win," Royal told the Longhorn Club weekly luncheon.

### Rice Institute

HOUSTON, Oct. 30 (AP)—Coach Jess Neely made two changes in his first team today as his Rice Owls completed contact work for Saturday night's game here with Clemson.

Howard Hoelscher, senior from Weimer, replaced Raymond Chilton, the team's top ground gainer, at fullback, while Charles Pollard, a junior from Henderson, replaced Buddy Dial at right end.

## KU's Mather Quits; Football Problem Remains Unsolved

LAWRENCE, Kan.—Chuck Mather yesterday resigned as head football coach at the University of Kansas, declaring he and his staff could "not solve the football problem" at the school.

The resignation will take effect at the end of the season.

In a statement issued after today's football practice, Mather said assistant coaches he had brought to Kansas also had resigned.

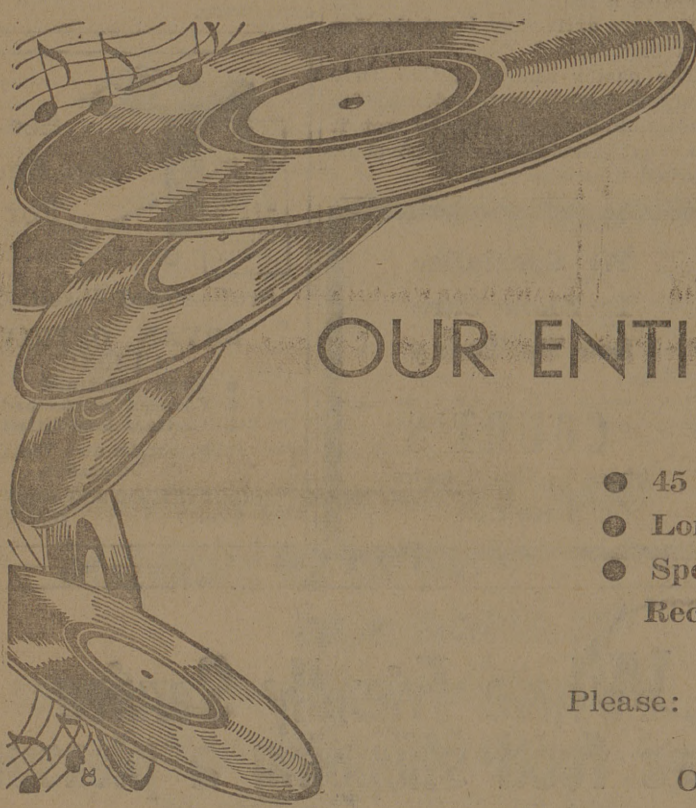
Kansas has won only 1 game this year, has lost 4 and tied 1.

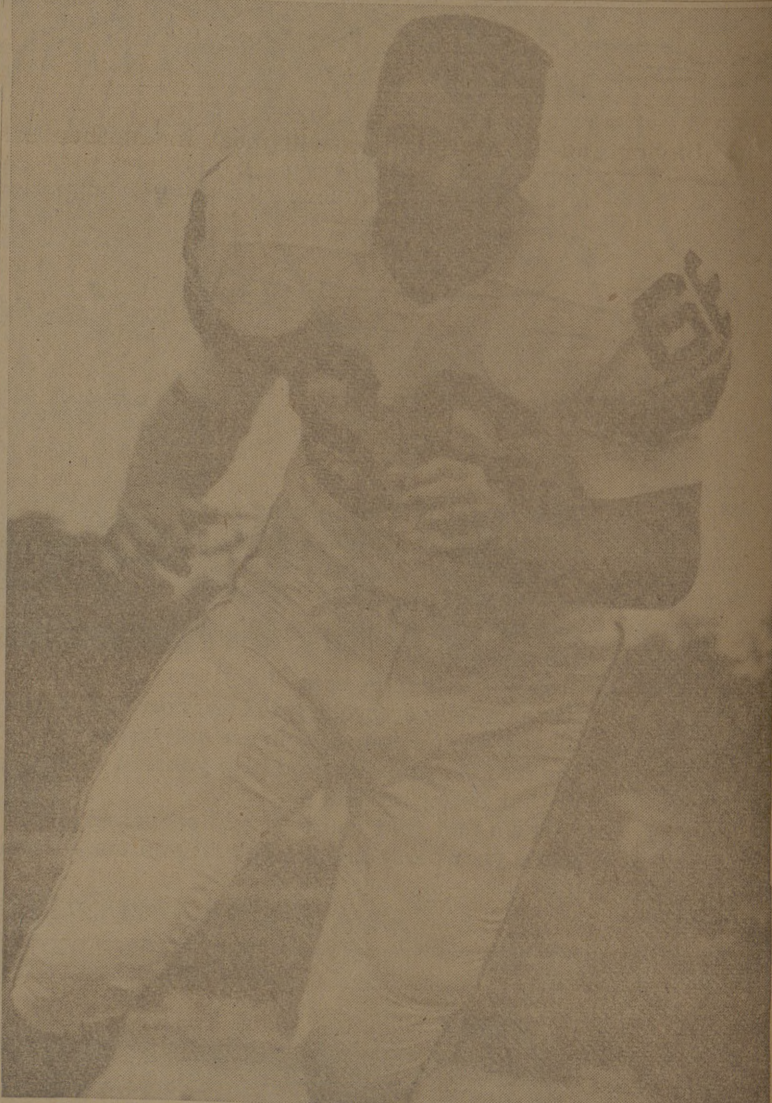
