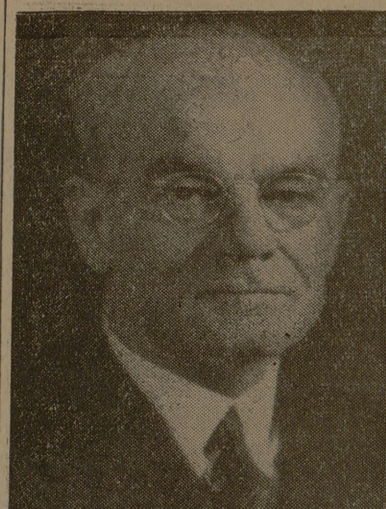
Authority On Bible To Speak At Luncheon Here Tuesday
