Terra Club Gives \$500 Scholarship

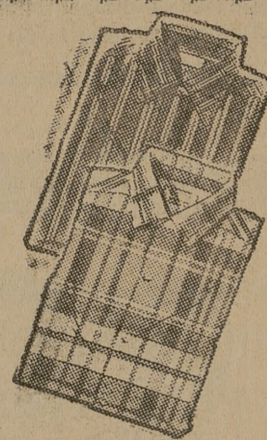
Dirk Gralka and Lee Gilby, have been awarded \$500 scholarships by the Terra Club of Houston.
