

Corps Makes Baseball Plans

Initial steps were taken yesterday toward the organization of Corps baseball leagues, with rough sketches of the plan calling for the program to be set up much the same as last year.

Corps baseball, matching Air Force groups and Army battalions, became a reality for the first time last year when both the Air Force and Army fielded a league made up of seven teams. Each team played six league games, and at the conclusion of play the Fifth Group and the Second Battalion, Second Regiment, winners of their

respective leagues, locked horns in a championship game which the Army nine won.

Tommy Kolterman, senior from Lyford, and Fred Meurer, junior from Fredericksburg, presented their proposal for guiding the program to Col. Henry Dittman, Professor of Air Science. Col. Dittman promised full support from the military department to once again furnish umpires for the games this year.

Kolterman said he and Meurer would see today about the possibility of using Bryan baseball dia-

monds. Other plans are being mapped. It is hoped play can begin in early March.

This lead was shortlived, however, as J. D. Harris passed to Davis Ford for the tying "A" Ordnance TD. The play covered 50 yards.

The next "C" Infantry tally was set up by a long pass completion from Don Farek to Bill Dresswood that put the ball on "A" Ordnance's five-yard line. Lyon then scored on the next play to give his team the lead which they never relinquished. Bob Worthey kicked the extra point.

In the other semi-final game, "B" Engineers defeated Squadron 13 by a score of 13-7.

Calvin Brummett spearheaded the "B" Engineer attack as he passed to Jim Roberts for the first TD and to Homer Hershey for the sec-

ond one. Roberts kicked the first extra point but missed the last one. Squadron 13's long TD came on a pass from their fine quarterback,

Charlie Graf, to Mike Brawner. The play was good for 60 yards. Graf then passed to Brawner for the extra point. Squadron 13 had a chance to tie the game up and possibly take the lead late in the game as Graf passed to Bruce Dement to put the ball on "B" Engineers five-yard line. But they were penalized 15 yards on the next play and couldn't regain the lost ground.
