Put dried fruit in jar, pour enough boiling water to just cover the fruit, place lid loosely on jar, and set aside to cool. When cool, close jar tightly and allow to stand in refrigerator overnight. Then add the wine and allow to stand another day. Serve well chilled over vanilla pudding or with whipped cream topping. Yield: 6 servings.

1 can pineapple chunks,	2 tablespoons prepared

Empty pineapple chunks and liquid into a small saucepan; set over moderate heat. Stir in the cornstarch. Keep stirring while mixture thickens slightly, then add the mustard. Stir to mix, cover, lower the heat, and cook for 5 minutes. Uncover, add the cherries and serve hot over pan-fried slices of picnic ham or Spam. Yield: to 5 serving

MEAT BALLS	BARBECUE
1 pound ground meat	1 small onion, chopped fine
1 teaspoon parsley	1 can baked beans
1½ teaspoons salt	2 tablespoons catsup
1 teaspoon pepper.	1 tablespoon molasses
1/4 cup cracker crumbs	(waffle, cane or Karo
1 egg	syrup may be substituted
3 tablespoons evaporated milk	1 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons fat	1 teaspoon dry mustard

Mix parsley, salt, pepper and crumbs with meat, making sure that the dry ingredients are well distributed throughout. Make a well in the meat and add the egg and milk, mixing again. Shape mixture into meat balls.

For the barbecue, brown the chopped onion in hot fat in a deep pan. When golden, add meat balls and brown quickly. Lower the heat, cover and continue cooking for 15 minutes. Uncover, add beans and remaining ingredients, stir to mix, then cover and cook for 5 more minutes. Yield: 4 servings.


