The limit is now 275 billion dollars, a ceiling which the adminis-

tration is approaching. The 280 billion limit will be in effect through June 30, 1959. This is the fourth time Congress has boosted the limit temporarily at

Eisenhower's request. Sen. Byrd (D-Va), chairman of the Senate Finance Committee argued without success the limit should be held to 278 billion dol-


