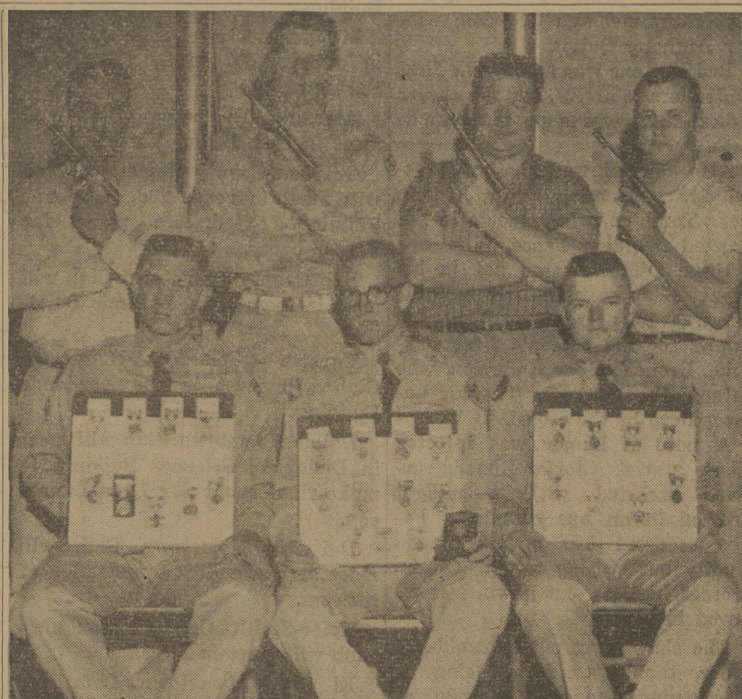

Cadets Seek Undisputed Lead In Weekend Tilts With Ponies

The Texas Aggies, with a 6-1 season record and a first-place tie with SMU and Texas for the Southwest Conference lead at 2-0, journey to Dallas today for games with the Mustangs Friday and Saturday.

Coach Beau Bell will call on Donnie Hullum of Baytown and Southpaw Toby Newton of Galveston to start on the mound against SMU, holding Sophomore Percy Sanderson of Nederland in relief.

Hullum scattered eight Baylor hits and yielded one earned run in defeating the Bears, 7-4, Saturday. Newton started in the Friday game with Baylor and gained credit for the 9-7 win although he was relieved by Sanderson in the fourth. Hullum also worked in the first Baylor game.

Major credit for the Aggies' fine showing belongs to a defensively strong sophomore infield that has turned in seven double plays in seven games, exceeding by two the number made last year by A&M in 20 games. The Aggies had a 5-15 record a year ago.

The quick-reacting keystone combination of second-baseman Dink Patterson of North Dallas and Shortstop Ralph Plumlee of Dallas Sunset points out the major improvement in an Aggie ball club that finished in the SWC cellar last year.

Third-sacker J. B. Carroll of College Station and Bill Houchin, Shreveport first-baseman, round out the all-sophomore infield that has provided the strong pitching staff fine defensive support.

Hullum, righthander, has hurled 24 1/3 innings this spring, giving up five runs on 17 hits. Only two of the runs off him have been earned and his 0.73 ERA is one of the best in the league. He has struck out 21, walked 11 and has a 2-0 record.

Newton, co-captain, has had trouble with his control on occasion but has compiled a 3-1 record. He has pitched 18 1/3 innings, striking out 23 and walking 18. His ERA is 2.79. In relief, righthander Sanderson has been fairly effective and boasts a 1-0 record. He has struck out seven and walked eight in 14 1/3 innings.

A consistent hitting attack has made the Aggies tough so far and a .246 team average is considerably ahead of last year's timid .221.

A trio of hitters has provided impetus to the A&M offense with All-SWC Catcher Gary Herrington of Baytown leading Aggie batters at .522. The junior backstopper has 12 hits in 23 at bats and seven RBIs. He has four doubles, a triple and a homer.

Tops in RBIs has been Co-Captain Jim Smotherman, senior right-fielder from Frisco, with 13. He is hitting .357 with six of his 10 hits being doubles. Left fielder Lloyd Stone, junior from Wichita Falls, is hitting .471 and has banged out a double and triple in his eight hits. In SWC play, Stone is hitting .600; Smotherman .400, Plumlee .375 and Herrington .333.

'Jocks', 5th Group Take Corps Leads

The 5th Group combined all their hits—one—with two errors and a walk to push across three runs in the last inning and nose out the 3rd Group, 3-2, thus taking over the Air Force League lead from the losers in Corps baseball.

Tommy Kolterman lashed out a long triple off losing pitcher Jesse Hargrove with two out, scoring two runners ahead of him. He then scored on an infield error. Charlie Graf was winning pitcher.

In Army play, the 2nd Battalion, 1st Regiment pounded out 15 hits for 14 runs to shut out the 3rd Battalion, 2nd Regiment behind the one-hit pitching of Bob Worthy. With the win, the "Jocks" edged into top place in the circuit.

In other action last night, the 1st Group mustered two runs in the final frame to defeat the 2nd group, 3-2. Jack Evans banged out two hits for the losers.

The championship game will be played Sunday, March 30, at the Lawview Soccer Field in Dallas. Game time is set at 2:30 p. m.

Representing the Dallas Soccer Association, the Aggies' opponents will be the Casa Blanca Cafe Soccer Club.

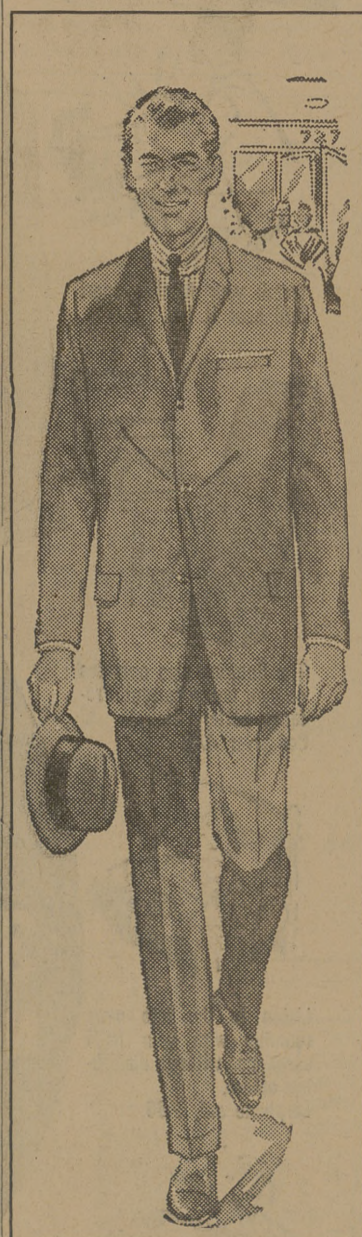

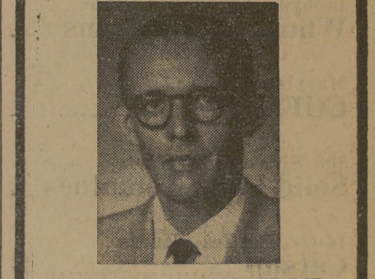
