New Plan

The new plan reads as follows: "Effective the fall semester, September, 1958, entering students with freshman classification will have military training as a part of their required curriculum for two years, with the exception of those who have had previous service with the armed forces, physically handicapped and foreign students.

"It is the intent of the Board in adopting this policy that the military training be such as to supplement a high standard of academic training and the Corps of Cadets will be so administered as to achieve this goal. The administration (including all members of the Academic Council) of the A&M College is charged with the responsibility to see that this policy is so administered that students participating in the Corps and other non-academic activities maintain a satisfactory academic record."
