Dr. T. E. Comfort, associate professor of modern languages, has been granted a one-year leave of absence for a mission to Iraq, effective Sept. 1.

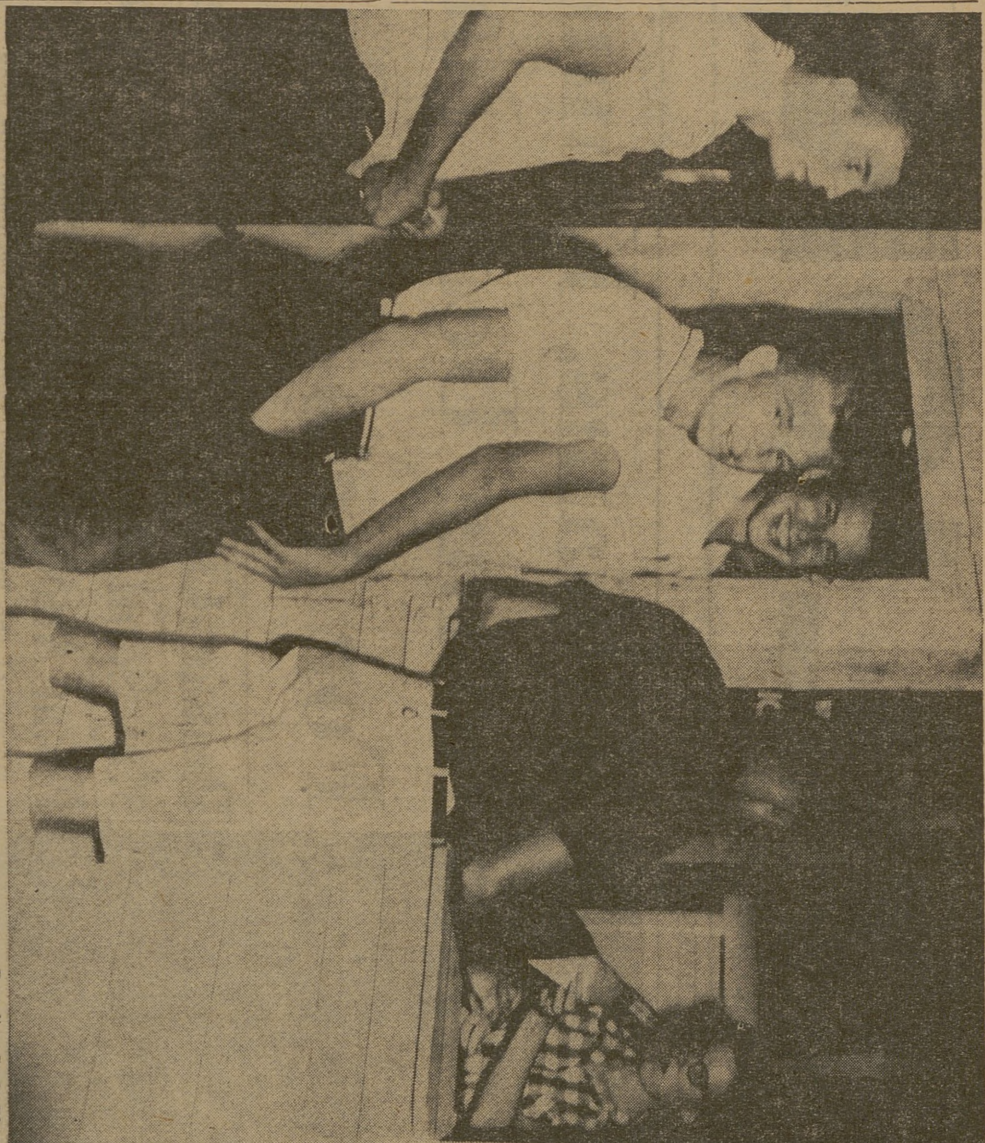
He will go to Washington, D.C., in July for a briefing session and will assume his new duties as director of the American Language Institute in Baghdad, Iraq, on August 1.

He will be accompanied to Baghdad by his wife and two children.

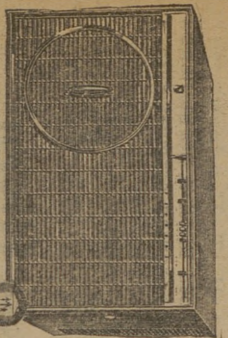

Agronomy Head Rogers Resigns

Dr. John S. Rogers has resigned as Department of Agronomy head to become director of agronomic crop research for the Associated Seed Growers, Inc., effective August 31.

Rogers, who has served with the A&M System since 1938, is nationally recognized for his work in developing and improving corn hybrids in Texas. Hybrids developed under his supervision and released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station now make up over 80 percent of the corn acreage in Texas.

He became head of the coordinated Department of Agronomy, which includes teaching, research and extension, in September, 1956. Dr. and Mrs. Rogers and their four daughters will continue to reside in College Station.

The company with which Rogers will become associated has crop breeding stations located in many areas in the United States, with headquarters at New Haven, Connecticut. However, the company's primary research unit for southwest crops is at San Antonio.

Stark Returns From Bomb Tests

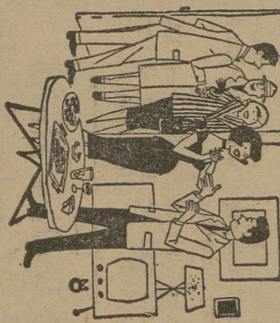

This is one of the larger school administration conferences in the United States, said Dr. Grady P. Parker, head of the Department of Education and Psychology.

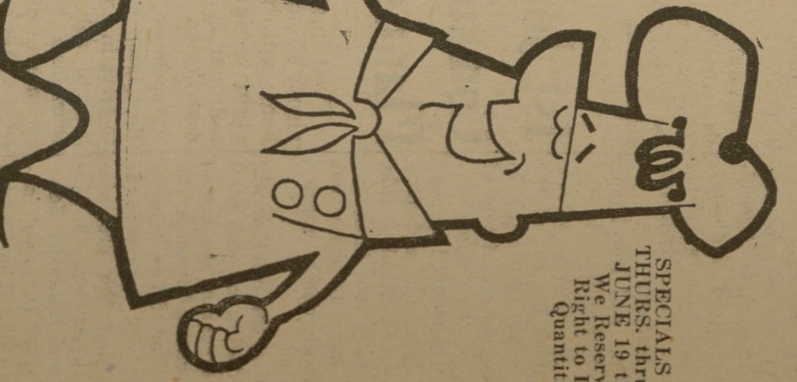
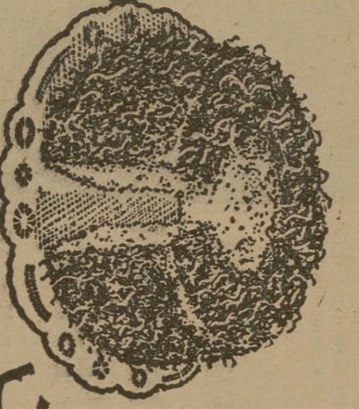
Two New Speakers Added in Grove
