AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—Georgia and Texas, two clubs dominated by juniors, open their football season here Saturday night with the Longhorns one-touchdown favorites.

Texas, which started with a 26-7 win over Georgia last fall and

went on to the Sugar Bowl, was ranked 11th in The Associated Press pre-season poll.

Georgia, with top notch quarterbacking, has 26 lettermen back after last year's disappointing 3-7 season.

Allen Hires Jim Stanley as Coach

Allen Academy High School Ramblers open their 1958-59 foot-

ball season Friday night under the leadership of a new coach.

He is Jim Stanley, former Aggie griddler who earned three varsity letters as a guard under Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant.

Stanley is married and the father of a young daughter.

Bobby Joe Conrad, former Aggie grid star, is enjoying considerable success in the professional ranks by making good use of a talent he never got the chance to show at A&M kicking.

He first displayed his kicking ability when the College All Stars of which Conrad was a member met the professional Detroit Lions. Conrad personally accounted for 15 of the winners' points by kicking four field goals and three extra points—a performance good enough to win the third highest number of votes in the Most Valuable Player ballot.

Then in his debut with the Chicago Cardinals, Conrad booted a

field goal in the last four seconds to give his team a tie.

The next week he scored 15 points by catching a TD pass, kicking two field goals and three extra points.

Incidentally, one of the field goals he has kicked was for 40 yards and another was a 40-yarder.

Charles Krueger, Texas A&M's all-American tackle and a team co-captain in 1957 now playing for the Los Angeles Rams, has broken an arm and will be out for the rest of the season. He was playing defensive end for the Rams.

Ken Beck, A&M's outstanding tackle and one of the Aggie tri-captains, is the only Southwestern to make Sports Magazine's pre-season all-American first team.

A&M athletic officials hold John Crow's No. 44 in such high esteem that the Heisman Trophy winner's jersey will be kept out of circulation this year.

Meanwhile, Crow continues to wear number 44 for the Chicago Cardinals.

Harry Chiti Hits Grand Slam

KANSAS CITY (AP)—While the American League's three leading hitters fought it out in the batter's box, Kansas City's Harry Chiti stole the spotlight with a grand slam home run Wednesday as the Boston Red Sox and the Athletics split a double header.

Chiti's blast won the first game 6-3. The Red Sox took the second 1-2 as Bill Regan, Frank Malzone and Don Buddin all hit for the A's. The Sox victory ended their eight game losing streak.

Pete Runnels of Boston, who went into the game leading the league's hitters with a .317 average, smacked four hits, including a home run in eight times at bat to boost his mark to .322.

Ted Williams of the Sox, tied with Bob Coxy of the A's for second in the first game to raise his average to .320. One of his hits also was a homer. He did not play in the second game.

Mantle Slugs 41st Homer of the Year

DETROIT (AP)—Mickey Mantle hit a tremendous home run all the way out of Briggs Stadium but Detroit's Roy Runnels survived the blast and defeated the New York Yankees 1-2 Wednesday as Rego Bertoni smashed a pair of home runs.

Mantle became the second player in history to hit a fair ball out of the stadium on the fly.

The right field fence at Briggs Stadium is 32 1/2 feet from home plate and the stadium is about 110 feet high. Mantle's homer, his 41st of the season, carried all the way across Trumbull avenue and hit about 30 feet high on a building across the street.

Eight players who were property of the New York Yankees last spring, now are owned by the Kansas City Athletics.

INTRAMURALS

Ourling the duties of athletic officers was a top item of discussion when Corps athletic officers met with Harry Welch, Director of Intramurals, in the YMCA Wednesday.

This year's Corps athletic officers are Ernie Turner, senior from Beaumont who is better known to Aggies for his accomplishments in the basketball court. Corps athletic sergeant is Hillary Runson.

Swimming will be the first sport in the fall 1958 program. The first events are to be held Monday, Sept. 29. Freshman 400 meter relays will be held at 7:15 p.m. and upperclassman 400 meter relays will follow at 7:45 p.m.

Welch explained that freshman and upperclassman swimming will be held at separate times. Freshmen will swim at 5 p.m. and upperclassmen are slated to swim at 7:45. The Devens Natatorium pool will be open from 4 to 6 p.m. on weekdays and from 3 to 5 p.m. on weekends for practice.

Spectators will not be allowed at intramural events this year for two reasons. First, most of the areas are too small to allow many spectators. As a result, those who are present get in the way and interfere with the activities. Second, the spectators should be doing something else—probably practicing intramurals.

Student activities handbooks were distributed to those present. Welch pointed out that being fair with it may keep outfits from making eligibility errors.

He also reminded that all mail from the intramural department will be placed in intramural message centers in front of Duncan and Sbas' mess halls.

The director pointed out the necessity of teaching freshmen the rules of flag football as well as other intramural sports, since the rules differ from high school activities with which the Ags are familiar.

He urged any sophomore who would like to be an intramural manager to meet with him in the Intramural Office on Sept. 22 at 4:30 p.m.
