Give SPB a Chance

Tuesday, after several minor revisions, the Executive Committee approved the bylaws written by the new, all-faculty Student Publications Board and set that body in motion to supervise and advise Student Publications at A&M.

Let us be as fair with this new addition to the campus as we have been with the changes in curriculum and general policy; let's give them a chance to succeed in making A&M a better university.

The Student Publications Board was unnoticed until last spring when it came into the campus eye and was debated, attacked and praised until the summer recess. The much-debated Board was dissolved and its bylaws rescinded Aug. 5 by the Executive Committee. And, initially, this looked like the beginning of the end of free journalism at Texas A&M. But that was hardly the case.

To date, there has been no censorship of any kind on any student publication. In fact, since a new director was not appointed to replace W. E. Kidd who resigned July 1 to return to the System Information Office, there has not been a staff supervisor in the building. The Battalion and other publications have been virtually running themselves with only the student editors' judgment guiding their publications' policies.

This is certainly not an indication of censorship. On the contrary, it seems to be a vote of confidence from the administration and the Executive Committee to the members of the various student publications showing their faith in the student editors and their staffs to conduct Student Publications in a manner that reflects credit on both the college and themselves.

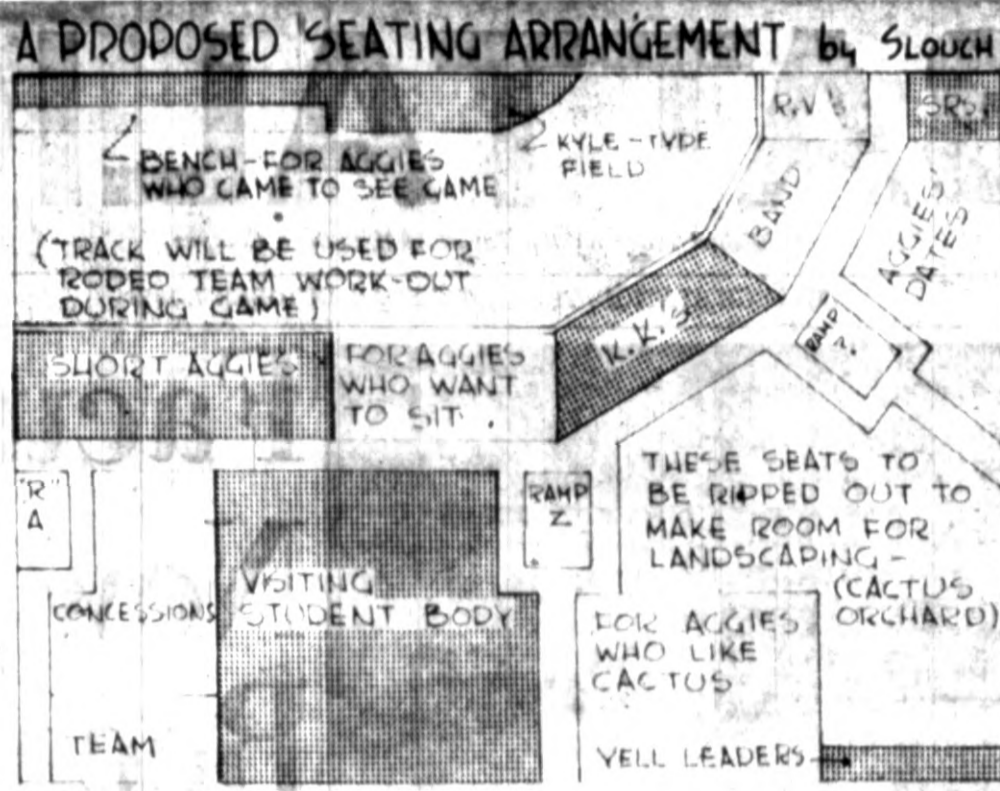
Of course, certain problems have come up in the interim between directors and boards—no business as large as this one could operate very long without close supervision of finances. But the experienced clerical staff has handled most of the business affairs and the other problems have been set aside for the new director and his board to weigh and approve.

The delay in selecting a new director is based on sound logic, although it did create an unnatural situation. Vice President Rudder has insisted on finding a man with the background and experience to give the program the kind of mature supervision it must have to be successful. Certainly this delay is justified if the man selected meets the high standards the vice president has set up.

The four faculty representatives on the SPB are sincerely attempting to make Student Publications at A&M a program to be admired and respected across Texas. The new director, too, will have this goal in mind. Student editors are wholeheartedly in favor of a better program of service to the college community and education for staff members and will have cooperated to the full extent.

It seems the men of the campus could do no less than give this new system a fair chance to succeed.

SPB Bylaws Approved

(Ed. Note: This is the first section of the Student Publication bylaws approved by the Executive Committee Thursday. The complete text will be run in this space during the week.)

The supervisory and advisory agency for all student publications of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas shall be designated as the Student Publications Board of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. This Board will report its activities to the vice-president of the college, through the director of Student Publications, who shall serve as permanent chairman of the Board. The Board will report to the deans of the several schools on matters pertaining to publications of their schools.

Membership

The Student Publication Board shall be composed of:

1. A permanent chairman. The Director of Student Publications shall be the permanent chairman of the Student Publications Board.
2. Four faculty members. The Dean of each of the four major schools of academic instruction — i.e. Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Engineering, and Veterinary Medicine — shall nominate one faculty member from his school, to serve as faculty representative on the Student Publications Board for a term of one year. Nominations shall be made to the vice-president for appointment.

Meetings

The Student Publications Board shall hold monthly meetings. Special meetings may be called by the chairman, either on his own initiative, or upon the request of one of the appointed student editors, or upon request of any individual member of the Student Publications Board.

Quorum

The presence at any regularly called meeting of any three members of the Student Publications Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, provided, however, that any decision reached by such a quorum of three members shall be a unanimous decision.

General Powers

The Student Publications Board shall function essentially as an advisory and supervisory agency for all student publications. Its decisions shall be subject to the approval of the Deans of the four major schools of academic instruction mentioned above, and through them of the vice-president of the college. Within this framework of organization, the Student Publications Board shall exercise advisory and supervisory powers.

Business Affairs

The Student Publications Board shall exercise advisory and supervisory powers in the regulation of the business affairs of the Office

of Student Publications, and of all student publications administered through that Office. The Executive Official of the Student Publications Board in all such business affairs shall be the Director of Student Publications. These business affairs shall include the recommending of the approval or disapproval of all contracts to be entered into in behalf of any publication, the fixing of advertising rates and the sales or subscription rates of any publication, and the requiring of reports, statements, or accounting of the affairs of any or all publications, as the Student Publications Board may deem necessary. All such activities shall be so conducted as to conform to the fiscal regulations of the College.
