MILWAUKEE (AP)—Manager Fred Haney refused to alibi the Braves' World Series collapse Thursday saying, "Instead of moaning, let's talk about how good their pitchers were." Contrary to what might be expected under the circumstances, the Braves, from Haney on down, did not appear to be downhearted over losing their world championship to the Yankees.

Ags Face Tough Terrapins

Coach Jim Myers' grin looked almost as big as Aggieland's mammoth Kyle Field after Saturday's win over the University of Missouri Tigers, but after looking at films of the Maryland squad his smile turned into a pained, woe-begone grimace.

The Terps have 23 returning lettermen, which broken down into positions reveal they are about two deep. Four of these men started the game against the Ags last year, with A&M winning 21-13.

Leading the Aggie attack will be Charley Milstead, the tailback

from Tyler, and fullback Gordon LeBoeuf of Port Neches. Against the Bengals Saturday Milstead guided the Cadets to the two touchdowns on the ground that paved the way for the 12-0 victory.

LeBoeuf made such long plunges through the line into the secondary that it looked like the Tiger safety man owed the powerful fullback some long-lasting debt.

A&M's play against Missouri Saturday was a marked improvement over the two previous games, both losses. The squad made few

er mistakes and the blocking along the line of scrimmage was sharp and pleasing.

The Terrapins are a big, tough team which was barely defeated by rugged Clemson, 8-0. The Terps use the Split-T formation as coached by Tommy Mont, and have enough of a weight advantage in the line to push the Cadets around.

Top backs for Maryland are halfback Gene Verardi and quarterback Bob Rusevlyan. Verardi is a speedster and the No. 1 Terp ground gainer. The ace lineman is Guard Rodney Breedlove, 215-pound all-American candidate.

Both clubs are due to be in top physical condition with no important injuries to date.
