

Princeton Meet To Be Opened By O&M Prof

Dr. Basil W. Wilson, associate professor of oceanography, has been invited to be the opening speaker at the Princeton University Conference on Berthing and Cargo Handling in Exposed Locations, Oct. 20-21.

Purpose of the conference is for reports to determine the feasibility of berthing, loading and unloading ships in relatively unprotected waters now that some tankers and bulk cargo carriers are too large for existing piers and wharves.

Wilson's remarks will be in connection with the response of a ship to waves and methods of estimated total kinetic energy which must be absorbed in permissible deformations of the ship, the fender system and the pier.

Oceanography Profs Attending Two Meetings

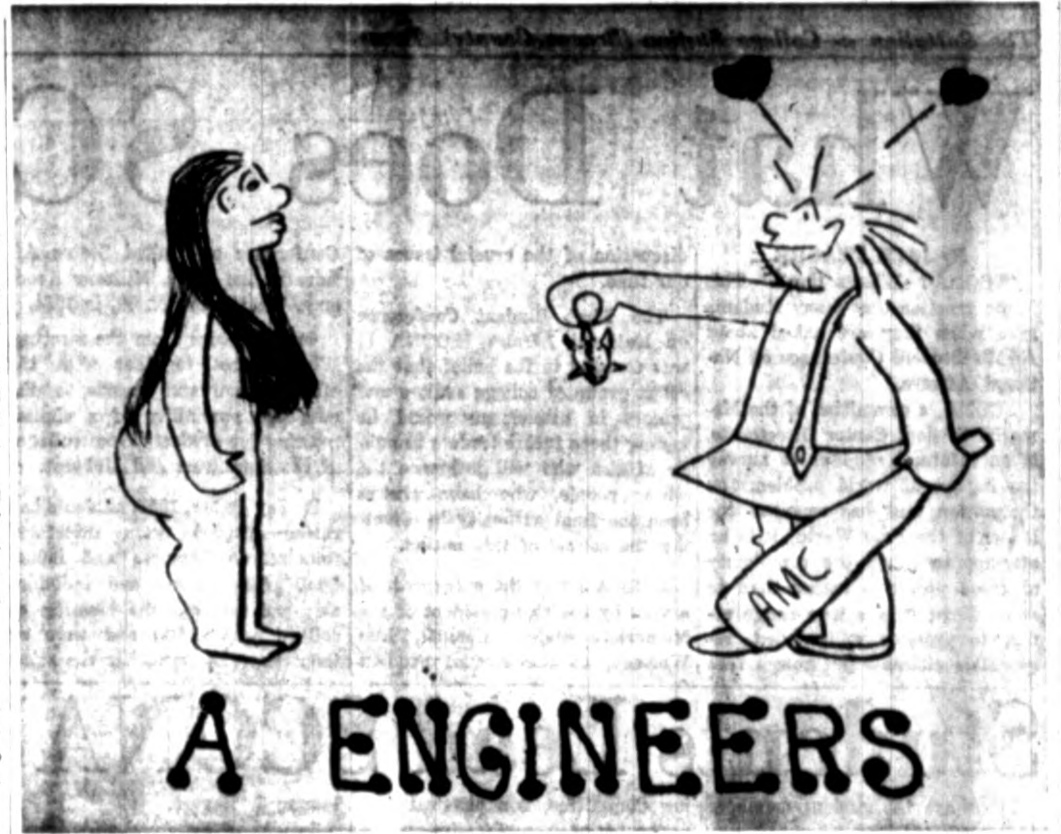
Several members of the staff of the Department of Oceanography and Meteorology are attending meetings this week at Biloxi, Miss., and El Paso.

Dr. Dale Leipper, head of the department, Dr. K. M. Rae and Albert W. Collier will be in Biloxi Wednesday through Saturday taking part in discussions with representatives of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission on the intensification of research in the shallow water areas of the Gulf Coast.

Dr. Rae is director of the department's marine laboratory program and Collier is chief scientist at the Galveston Marine Laboratory. They were accompanied to Biloxi by Harold Loesch, a graduate student from Oglesby.

Dr. Vance E. Moyer, coordinator of radar meteorology, left Tuesday for Texas Western College at El Paso to take part in the First National Conference on High Atmosphere. He will participate in a discussion of contemplated weather studies in West Texas.
