

Strong TCU Squad Invades A&M With Revenge in Mind

Title-favorite Texas Christian, deep in experience and talent, invades Kyle Field Saturday afternoon to become A&M's first Southwest Conference foe.

Kickoff is 2 p.m. with the season's top local crowd upwards of 30,000 expected for the classic that began in 1897. The TCU series is the second oldest on the Aggie schedule with only the A&M-Texas series, beginning in 1894, longer.

The game looms as another thriller in the recent battles of the series with the Frogs bringing a 3-1 record into the game here. Only nationally ranked Iowa has beaten TCU. The Frogs rolled over Kansas and Texas Tech out of the league and Arkansas in the conference.

Following losses to Texas Tech and Houston the single wing Aggies of Jim Myers have been improving steadily with wins over Missouri and Maryland giving the thin Cadets a 2-2 non-conference record.

Last year's 7-0 Aggie win was the largest margin of victory between the schools since 1953 when the Aggies won 20-7 at Fort Worth. A&M marred TCU's Cotton Bowl bound clubs with close wins in 1955 and '56. The 1955 Aggies upset the Frogs, 19-16, and a year later in the rain and storm of Kyle Field the Aggies roared from behind for a 7-6 decision.

Both clubs are expected to be at top strength for the game. TCU's Robert Little, sophomore tackle, is

back after a bad ankle forced him out of the Tech game last week and the two Aggies who were hurt before the Maryland game are in good shape. They are Center Gale Oliver of Refugio and Back Bill Cauthorn of Del Rio.

Tailback Charlie Milstead of Tyler was A&M's top star in the 14-10 win over the Terps. The blond junior played almost flawless ball as the Aggies came from behind on an 88-yard touchdown drive and then played fine defensive ball the entire fourth quarter with their backs on the goal line.

Roy Northrup, sophomore from Amarillo, turned in the finest center play of the year for the Aggies, earning for him a starting assignment this week. Others who

showed well were Tackle Ken Beck of Minden, La., and Fullback Gordon LeBoeuf of Port Neches.

Milstead's punting suffered in the game due to the 25-mile per hour wind which held his average to 27 yards. He had led the nation for two weeks with a 50-yard average. He now is second in the conference with a 40.1 mark.

In many respects the Aggie showing in the Maryland fourth period resembled last year's Aggie win over TCU. The Aggies had scored early on the Frogs, then for three quarters staved off repeated TCU threats deep in Aggie territory.

The Aggies hold the edge in the 53-game series, 29 wins to 19 with five ties.

Fish Coach Nursing Sorrow As Cadets, Cubs Vie Tonight

Freshman Coach Bill Jones' hair was hanging low on his forehead and his usual smile wasn't tugging at his lips last night as the Fish finished their last practice before taking on the once-beaten Baylor Cubs in Waco tonight at 7:30.

Shadows of concern were evident on his face as he indicated the Fish hadn't improved much since they fought the Texas Christian University Wogs to a 6-6 tie in muddy Amon Carter Stadium last week.

"We're still not good enough as a team," he said. "We're only a bunch of good players."

Jones said the squad was still not polished to a luster. "We have the fundamentals down well, but we haven't shown any real zip in practice."

"The boys know the plays but have looked only average at workouts," he continued. "Only on occasion have they shown real spirit and drive."

Noting that the team didn't

show the enthusiasm in practice displayed in their opening 12-0 win over the University of Houston and the tie with TCU, the tall mentor could offer no explanation for the showing.

"If coaches knew everything about the players, we'd be great," he commented.

The Fish will meet a speedy Baylor squad tonight which holds the 1957 SWC freshman championship. The Cubs lost their 1958 opener to the Texas Shorthorns in Austin last Thursday, 13-14.

But things weren't all black that night for the Cubs. Tommy Minter, the 165-pound blazer from Gladewater who runs the 100 in 9.8, broke loose for 50- and 54-yard touchdown gallops, living up to pre-season predictions.

Also looking good in defeat were Ronnie Bull of Bishop, who runs the 100 in 10 flat, and Danny Griffin of Frederick in the backfield. Outstanding linemen were guard Ken Chancellor, 210, of Gilmer, center Herby Atkins, 177, of Nederland, and guard Bill Hicks, 195

of Little Rock, Ark.

The Cubs promise to attempt upsetting the Fish with a stout running attack, bolstered by a battery of backfield men. Coach Jones said his offense would deviate from passing to running depending on the course of the game.

Tailback Rodger McFarland, who has collected well over 200 yards rushing in the first two games and has completed 11 of 16 passes—one a touchdown toss against TCU—will again guide the Fish from the deep spot.

The rest of the opening Fish lineup will be about the same except for fullback, where Eddie Vaz Dyke will replace Jim Murphy. Murphy, who was outstanding on offense against the Wogs, is confined to the college hospital with influenza.

Three other cadets will miss tonight's action. Dink Love, second-string end, suffered a six-inch cut above the eye in practice; guard Joe Miller is also in the hospital with the flu, and blocking back R. L. McClung is recovering from a kidney injury.
