Farmers High For TCU

A&M charged through practice yesterday in what Coach Jim Myers called "One of the most spirited sessions of the year."

All told the squad was on the field one hour, but "a lot was accomplished in the short time."

The Cadet eleven will go into the TCU game in their best physical condition of the year. Only players expected to miss the game is wingback Jon Few. The sophomore started the Maryland game.

Squad members have a healthy respect for the TCU team, saying, "it'll be the toughest one of the season." The Frogs boast the finest defensive and offensive club in the Southwest Conference. They have a 3-1 record, losing only to the Iowa Hawkeyes.

Kickoff is 2 p.m. with the season's top local crowd upwards of 30,000 expected for the classic that began in 1897. The TCU series is the second oldest on the Aggie schedule, with only the A&M-Texas series beginning in 1894, longer.

Last year's 9-5 Aggie win was the largest margin of victory between the schools since 1933 when the Aggies won 29-7 at Fort Worth.

Roy Northrup, sophomore from Amarillo, turned in the finest center play of the year for the Aggies against Maryland, earning for him a starting assignment this week.

The only other expected change in the lineup will be Randy Sims,

the sophomore from Houston, at wingback.

Sports in Brief

Seven varsity runners and seven freshmen will compete for A&M in the Houston Invitational Cross-Country meet at Houston Friday afternoon at 4.

Coach Charley Thomas' Aggie contingent will be led by Freddie Dulock of Axtell, who finished second in a fine showing against the University of Houston last week here.

Dulock was clocked in 15:04 over the 3-mile Aggie course. The Cougars defeated the Aggies, 23-32 in the opening meet of the year.

At Houston Friday the Aggies will compete with teams from the University of Houston, Texas, McNeese and Lamar Tech. The meet will be run over a 4-mile course in the varsity division and a 3-mile circuit for the frosh.

The Aggie varsity runners other than Dulock will be Richard Hickman of College Station, Jimmie King of Monahans, Jack Heald of Dalhart, Don Carver of Amarillo, John Blake of Temple and C. J. Hajovsky of El Campo.

The Aggie Fish-runners will be Thomas Johnston of Franklin, Malcolm Hardee of Groveton, Thadis Crooks of Hooks, Ralph Williams of Terrell, Robert Bryant of Galveston, Foster Webb of Rusk and Fred Hink of Houston.

The Aggies will run Oklahoma State at College Station on Oct. 25 in a 2 p. m. match over a 3-

mile course. Remaining cross-country meets for A&M:

Nov. 1—Texas Invitational at Austin; Nov. 8—SMU at Dallas; Nov. 17—Southwest Conference meet at Fort Worth and Nov. 30—Bill Williams AAU meet at Houston.
