Civil Service Jobs Get Income Boost

New starting salary for a civil service employe with a bachelor's degree and no experience will range from \$4,040 to \$4,980 per annum, W. V. Gill, regional director of the Eighth U. S. Civil Service Region, said.

Under this year's recruiting plan, students with a B average or who are in the upper 25 per cent of their class and who make higher scores on the written examination will be qualified for consideration by employing agencies at the higher salary.

All persons who attain final eligibility in the management intern portion of the examination will be qualified for consideration at \$4,980 per annum. Management intern eligibles who, in addition to a bachelor's degree have one year of graduate study or qualifying experience, will be qualified for consideration at \$5,985 per annum.

Students teaching at Bryan High are Robert Harrell, J. L. Hammack, Armon Hewitt and Charles Barlow. Frank Braden Jr. and John Farley are at A&M Consolidated and Ralph Garcia is teaching at Anson Jones Junior High.

The students work 15 hours a week and the only compensation is six semester hours credit, according to Frank Braden Jr., one of the students and also president of the A&M Chapter of the National Education Assn.

They are presently under the supervision of members of the regular school staff but will eventually assume full responsibility of a class for a period of from six to nine weeks, according to Braden.
