

Aggie Lightning Drops Bears, 33-27

Score Four Times in Last Half

There weren't too many clouds in the sky at Waco Saturday night but lightning struck the Baylor Bears in the second half when a fighting Texas Aggie eleven overcame a 27-7 deficit in 11 minutes to win going away, 33-27.

The first 41 minutes were all Baylor's, and they made good use of them by racking up 19 first

downs to A&M's 9, gained 218 yards pushing to the Aggies' 69, ran 44 rushing plays to the Cadets' 20, had 56 total plays the Farmers' 29, and a 27-7 lead—and all for naught.

The debacle started midway in the third quarter after Baylor had scored their fourth and final touchdown and had kicked off to the down-trodden Ags.

Fullback Luther Hall returned the kickoff 21 yards to the Bears' 47 yard line, and Baylor, obliging enough, then helped the cause with a 15-yard personal foul penalty to put the Cadets on the 37. Reserve tailback Ed Dudley was held three times without a first down, then gambled on the fourth and romped 26 yards downfield to the Baylor 13.

Neville Scores

Two plays later the plucky athlete cocked back his arm and threw a touchdown pass into the waiting arms of end Travis Nev-

ill. A Dudley to Powell Berry pass was incomplete on the extra point attempt.

Baylor was a little anxious on the ensuing kickoff and fumbled the ball on their 25-yard line, with A&M's Joe Munson recovering. Dudley, still busy at his tailbacking chores, threw another strike to Neville who tumbled out of bounds on the one yard line and A&M was again in scoring position. Fullback Luther Hall took the handoff on the next play and roared over for the touchdown. The scoreboard now read 19-27. Dudley converted successfully to make it 20-27.

Coach Jim Myers sent the first squad in to replace the tired second unit on the kickoff and the fired up Ags held the Baylor squad for downs, forcing them to kick to A&M's 20.

Milstead On Loose

Milstead took over the driver's seat with a 19-yard run up the middle to put the ball on their own 40. Abandoning the ground game for the aerial paths, the Ag junior threw four out of six passes into the arms of big end John Tracey, the last one into the

end zone for the touchdown. Trailing by one point, 26-27, the Farmers elected to gamble for the two points on the conversion but the pass was broken up and the Cadets trailed by one point.

A&M kicked and again forced the Bears to punt, with wingback Randy Sims returning the ball 21 yards. A penalty moved the ball back to A&M's 26 yard line but it didn't seem to bother the Farmers as they ran and passed their way up to the 37-yard line and a first down.

Hall Adds Capper

Hall again stepped his way into the limelight as he sped down the sideline, caught Milstead's pass on the 50 without slowing down, then outran his pursuers to the goal line for the touchdown that put the Aggies out front 32-27.

Milstead then made the humiliation complete when he stepped back and converted the extra point to make the scoreboard read 33-27.

LSU Captures Top Position in AP Poll

Not a single Southwest Conference team made the top ten in this week's Associated Press college football poll which saw unbeaten Louisiana State take over the No. 1 spot.

Army, leader the last two weeks, dropped to third place as a result of its 14-14 tie with Pittsburgh. Iowa took over second place and Auburn, the poll leader until it was tied by Georgia Tech two weeks ago, moved up a notch to fourth place. Ohio State, the second place team last week, dropped to fifth as it was held to a tie by Wisconsin.

Rounding out the top ten in order are Mississippi, Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Colorado and Purdue.

Rice moved up to 14th place, the highest of any SWC team. The Owls won a 34-7 decision from Texas, which dropped all the way from fourth place to 16th. Texas Christian is in the No. 18 spot.

Farmers Take Monday Off While Coaches View Films

The Aggie griddees celebrated their Saturday 33-27 upset win over the Baylor Bears by taking the day off Monday from the practice field. They viewed movies of the Baylor game and heard the scouting report on next week's opponent, Arkansas.

"I told you this Friday night," said Coach Jim Myers, "that win or lose, there would be no work-out Monday evening."

It wasn't a holiday for the coaches though, who spent the day going over films and planning their strategy for the Razorbacks.

Don Smith, veteran end from Phillips, was A&M's major casualty from the Waco game, suffering a serious injury to his collar bone that will probably keep him out for the rest of the season. If he plays at all it will not be before the Texas game, Thanksgiving day.

Top hands for the Cadets against Baylor were the two tailbacks, Charley Milstead and Ed Dudley. The two athletes joined forces to pick up 228 yards passing and three touchdowns.

"Dudley provided the spark in our 4-touchdown rally the final 15 minutes," Myers said, "but Milstead was the big gun for us. It was the finest hour for our tailbacks and John Tracey."

Tracey caught seven passes for 102 yards and a touchdown.
