Intercom System Installed for I.E.D.

A new intercommunication system has been installed in the Department of Industrial Education. J. L. Boone Jr. of the department set up the system. He said it consists of four surplus telephones operated by a multiple signal circuit. The system operates on four volts of direct current.

Boone said the system connected the three shops of the department with the office and is designed to allow more privacy than the ordinary intercommunication system.

The system is set up on a party line basis. With multiple signal circuit a switchboard is not needed and four buttons on each telephone are used to call the other stations. It is possible to carry on a four-party conference on the system.

Cloud Candidate For Rhodes Grant

Donald R. Cloud has been approved as A&M's representative in Texas Rhodes Scholarship competition. Dr. R. H. Ballinger, college representative for Rhodes Scholarships said yesterday.

Cloud, 1958-59 Corps Commander, a senior economics major from Kerens, was approved by vice president Earl Rudder on the basis of a superior academic record, college activities and demonstration of qualities of leadership, Ballinger said.

A Rhodes Scholarship, tenable at the University of Oxford in England, is worth 750 English pounds per year. The normal term of the scholarship is for two years, with the possibility of obtaining a third year in some cases.

If Cloud receives a scholarship, he plans to study in the school of Philosophy - Politics - Economics, Ballinger said.

He will appear before the Texas Rhodes Scholarship Selection Committee December 17 in Houston. The committee will nominate 2 from Texas to appear before the district selection committee in New Orleans, December 20.

The committee will award six Rhodes Scholarships at the meeting. District 6 is composed of the states of Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma.

Two Aggies have previously won the scholarships. Charles Wright Thomas, '22, who received his B. S. degree in Chemical Engineering and Jack Edward Brooks, '47, who received a B. S. in Electrical Engineering were awarded scholarships to Oxford.
