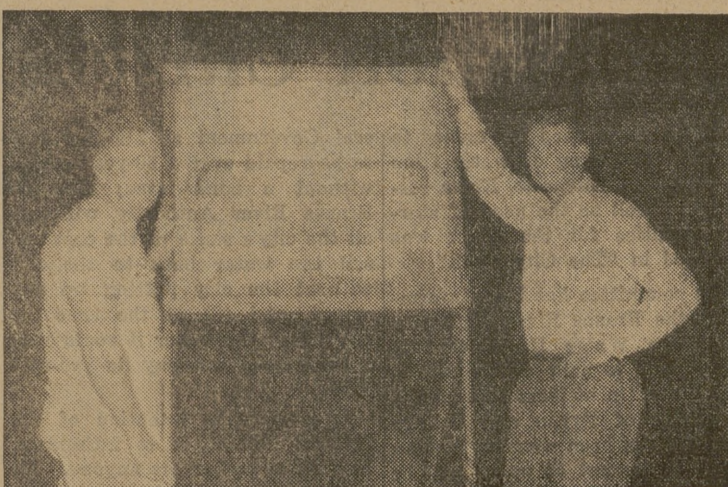

Tall Men and Yankees Big Hit in Conference

The Southwest Conference basketball campaign begins in less than two weeks and don't be surprised if you see some of the teams with almost as many boys from out of the state as from Texas.

The conference rooster-recording book is just out and it shows that Texas A&M, Baylor, Southern Methodist and Texas will have fellows from such states as New York, Kentucky, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Louisiana, Arizona, California, Oklahoma, Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Wisconsin.

It's a trend that started a decade ago and has grown each year. This time there'll be more out-of-staters than ever before.

The conference race should produce some high-rated teams this year. There are probably more strong teams than last season or perhaps for five years. Most of them are bulging with veterans and there are plenty of tall fellows.

The biggest men in the league are Wayne Clark of Texas, a 6-11 sophomore from San Antonio; Harold Hudgens of Texas Tech and H. E. Kirchner of Texas Christian, each soaring 6-10. Hudgens is a sophomore from Ballinger. Kirchner is a senior from Houston.

There are two 6-9 boys. One is all-conference Tom Robitaille of Rice and the other is Pat Nokes of Texas Tech.

There are four 6-8 youngsters: Wayne Lawrence of Texas A&M, who hails from Pawcatuck, Conn.; John Englemann of Southern Methodist, who comes from Hiawatha, Kan.; Albert Almanza, who's from El Paso, and John Moore of Baylor, who's a product of Victoria.

Texas Tech, with 11 lettermen and every regular back from last year, and Texas Christian, with 10 lettermen and all its regulars, look

like the outfits to fight it out for the championship.

Texas A&M should be hard to handle, Arkansas always is, Rice looks very strong and Southern Methodist will be tough as usual. SMU however, won't bother anybody as much as usual. The Methodists are on probation and couldn't participate in the NCAA playoffs if they won the conference championship.

Cudd Awarded \$500 Scholarship
