

Health Fees, Services Topic For Meet Here

The question of standardizing health fees and health services offered to students of colleges and universities will be discussed here at the annual meeting of the Southwestern Division of the American College Health Association, Dec. 14-15.

Dr. C. R. Lyons, director of Student Health Service, is president of the Southwestern Division which is comprised of Texas, New Mexico, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma.

Delegates to the meeting will include physicians, nurses, teachers and student deans from colleges and universities in the five-state area.

The program will open at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 14 with the welcome talk by Earl Rudder, vice-president of A&M College. Kingman Reid, president of Higham, Neilson, Whitridge and Reid, Inc., Boston, Mass., will discuss the latest trends in college health service.

A panel discussion will be held Sunday evening on the subject "The Role of Department of Health and Physical Education in the Health of Students." E. D. Brindley, chairman of the Department of Health and Physical Education, Texas A. and I. College, Kingsville, will preside.

Following an early morning business meeting Monday, two panel discussions will be held. Presiding at these discussions will be Paul White, director of Student

Health Services, University of Texas and Margaret Jarrett, nursing supervisor, Midwestern University.

Addressing the delegates at the noon luncheon will be the Rev. James B. Argue, pastor of the A&M Methodist Church. He will speak on the subject "The Role of Religion in College Health Service."

John W. Hill, director, Person-

nel Insurance and Safety, A&M College System, will make a talk on health and safety. He is general chairman of the Higher Education Section, National Safety Council.

Research opportunities in college health service will be outlined by Dr. Marcel Patterson, director of Student Health Services, Medical Branch, University of Texas, Galveston.

Potts, Darling Receive \$200 Agronomy Awards

Richard Kent Potts and Dale R. Darling, agronomy majors at Texas A&M College, have been awarded undergraduate scholarships sponsored by the Trans-Mississippi Golf Association.

Each award provides \$200 for one semester.

Potts, a senior from Bryan, and Darling, a junior from College Station, were presented the awards at the recent annual dinner of the 13th annual Texas Turfgrass Conference here.

Dr. Marvin H. Ferguson, Mid-Continent Director and National Research Coordinator of the United States Golf Association Green Section, made the presentations.

Recipients of these awards must be a junior or senior majoring in agronomy with a special interest

in turf and are chosen by a committee appointed by the head of the Department of Agronomy. Upon completion of their undergraduate work, Potts and Darling plan to enter graduate school and specialize in turf research.

Potts, a lieutenant colonel on the Corps Staff, is active in several student organizations. He has received a number of awards and honors, including the National Plant Food Institute Agronomy Achievement Award in 1957, Trans-Mississippi Golf Association Award in the spring of 1958 and the Danforth Fellowship in the summer of 1958.

Last spring, Potts won the Agriculturist Award for an article entitled "Turf, A Part of Modern Agriculture". He grows and sells turf grass for reproduction.

Two Professor Get Grad Scholarships

Two assistant professors here have been chosen as recipients of National Faculty Fellowships of the National Science Foundation.

They are Joseph M. Egar of the Department of Geology and Geophysics and Earl Logan Jr. of

the Department of Engineering.

Egar's fellowship provides a stipend of \$7,900 for a period of 15 months. He will enter the University of Oklahoma in June, 1959, to study branches of mathematics essential for utilizing high speed computers in the analyses of various problems encountered in geology.

Logan will receive a stipend of \$7,100 for 12 months and will enter Purdue University in September, 1959, to work toward a Ph.D. in mechanical engineering.

The National Science Foundation awards these fellowships to individuals to improve their competence as college or university teachers of science, mathematics and engineering. Selection is made solely on the basis of ability.

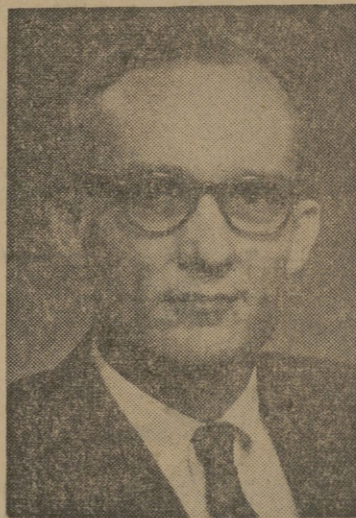
