NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the City of College Station, Texas, on the 17th day of February, 1959, pursuant to the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, to-wit:

ORDINANCE NO. 273

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION; PRESCRIBING CERTAIN TERMS AND CONDITIONS RELATING THERETO; MAKING PROVISION FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE INTEREST THEREON AND PRINCIPAL THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR AN ELECTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS; AND CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE SUBJECT

WHEREAS, under the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and the Home-Rule Charter of the City of College Station, Texas, said City has authority to issue tax bonds for street improvement purposes; and

WHEREAS, before such bonds can be issued, they must be approved at an election by majority of the duly qualified resident electors of said City who own taxable property within said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of said City wishes to proceed with the authorization of such bonds and for the election for such purpose; THEREFORE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION:

Section 1: That an election shall be held in an throughout the City of College Station, Texas, on the 17th day of February, 1959, at which election there shall be submitted to the duly qualified resident electors of said City who own taxable property within said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition, to-wit:

PROPOSITION

SHALL THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS, BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE THE BONDS OF SAID CITY IN THE AMOUNT OF \$350,000, MATURING SERIALLY WITHIN 30 YEARS FROM THEIR DATE OF ISSUANCE, AND BEARING INTEREST AT A RATE NOT TO EXCEED 5% PER ANNUM, FOR THE PURPOSE OF CONSTRUCTING PERMANENT STREET IMPROVEMENT AND FOR SAID CITY AND TO LEVY AN ANNUAL TAX ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN SAID CITY SUFFICIENT TO PAY THE INTEREST ON SAID BONDS AS IT ACCRUES AND TO CREATE AND PROVIDE A SINKING FUND TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF SAID BONDS AS IT MATURES? (The probable period of usefulness of the improvements for which the bond funds are to be expended is 40 years.)

Section 2: That the probable period of usefulness of the improvements for which the bond funds are to be expended is 40 years.

Section 3: That said election shall be held at the following polling places, and the election officials shall be, for the purpose of this election, as follows:

(1) In Ward No. 1, at the Music Room in the A. & M. Consolidated School Building. Presiding Judge: Dr. L. G. Jones. Assistant Judge: Mrs. H. Bronson. Clerk: Mrs. J. B. Hervey.

(2) In Ward No. 2, at 111 Walton Drive in the College Hills Shopping Center. Presiding Judge: Mrs. Charles Richardson. Assistant Judge: Mrs. Omer Sperry. Clerk: Mrs. J. Y. Alexander.

(3) In Ward No. 3, at the College Station City Hall. Presiding Judge: Mrs. W. D. Lloyd.

Russians Release US Army Convoy

HELMSTEDT, Germany (AP) —Under sharp attack by the United States, Soviet authorities Wednesday turned loose a U. S. Army truck convoy they had held in East Germany for 53 hours.

The four-truck convoy and its five grim soldiers rolled into West Germany, past the checkpoint on the border between East and West Germany, at 6:12 p.m.

Hawaii Statehood Bill Gains Speed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A bill to make Hawaii the 50th state moved one step forward Wednesday—a 5-4 vote of approval by the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

Principal backers of the measure predicted it would pass by overwhelming majorities in both the House and Senate before Congress adjourns this summer. Even opponents appeared to view enactment as inevitable.

Rep. Leo W. O'Brien (D-N.Y.), a leading backer of the bill, said he hoped the bill would reach a vote in the House before the Easter recess, beginning March 26, or immediately thereafter.

In the Senate, a separate Hawaii statehood bill sponsored for the first time by a majority of the 98 senators will be given a three-day committee hearing starting Feb. 25.

Department, backed by President Eisenhower, had delivered a stiff protest to Moscow against any interference with the Western Allies' access to Berlin.

The convoy, en route from Berlin to West Germany, was detained Monday afternoon within sight of the East-West border.

The Soviet army demanded an inspection of the cargoes. But Findley Burns Jr., political adviser to the U. S. Army mission in East Berlin who came here for the final negotiations said the Soviets were not allowed to inspect the inside of the trucks.

The United States thus won a point in its efforts to prevent the Soviets from gradually clamping a stranglehold on the highway supply line to Berlin, isolated 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain.

Following three U. S. Army protests Tuesday in Berlin and Frankfurt, President Eisenhower announced to his news conference Wednesday that a vigorous demand was being made by the State Department for release of the convoy. He said the United States never had allowed the U.S.S.R. inspection privileges.

The State Department note released later said refusal to let the trucks through without inspection was a "clear violation" of American rights, under four-power agreements since 1945, to free access to Berlin.

Burns declined to give any details of his 2½ hours of negotiations here for release of the American convoy.

Ten minutes after his talks were concluded the convoy roared into Helmstedt with lights blazing and proceeded immediately to a U. S. military compound. There the corporal in charge, Richard C. Masiero of West Stockbridge, Mass. and the four soldier drivers hoped to get some sleep. Newsmen were not allowed to talk to them.

The 2½-ton trucks were loaded with jeeps.
