## News of the World

Macmillan and Khrushchev Bitter

KIEV, Ugraine—British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev ended talks yesterday in an atmosphere of bitter chill. The British visitor warned Khrushchev of grave danger if anyone interferes with the Western powers' rights in Berlin.

"But Khrushchev is not budging an inch," a British spokesman said, "and Macmillan is not budging an inch, either. Make of that what you will."

Explosion Threatens H-Bomb Factory ALDERMASTON, England—A violent explosion rocked Britian's big H-bomb factory here yesterday, killing two men

Airplanes were warned to avoid the region 45 miles west of London. But they resumed flights when officials said the blast was caused by conventional explosives and there was no radioactive danger. Traffic was permitted on nearby roads.

It was the sixth incident at the base in the past four years. Britain's Atomic Energy Authority set up a board of
