A&M Wins Second In Debate Tourney

Aggie debaters took second place honors among affirmative teams at the annual University of Texas Round-Up Forensic Tournament in Austin last weekend.

Jay Hirsch and Andrew Scouvaloff posted a 5-2 record in the tournament, although officials informed the pair that they were checking a doubtful ballot which may reveal their record to have been 6-1, Dr. H. E. Hierth, director of debate at A&M said.

In the individual contests, Scouvaloff won a medal for placing first in extemporaneous speaking.

On Feb. 20-21, Hirsch and Scouvaloff placed fifth in the 26-school forensic tournament at Texas Christian University, posting a 4-2 record.

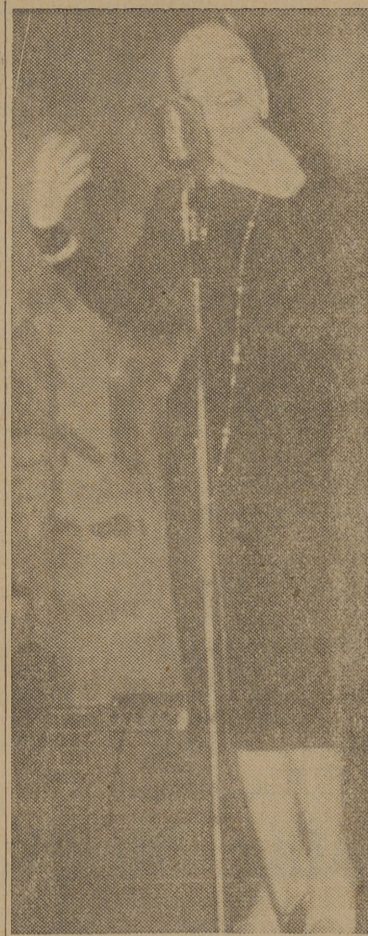
Easter Seals To Be Mailed On March 5

Thousands of sheets of 1959 Easter Seals are going into the mail on or about March 5, reminding residents of Brazos, Robertson, Grimes, Washington and Burleson counties that crippled children are "yours too."

The mailing, greatest in the campaign's 26 year history, is the first step in the month long appeal conducted by The Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults Inc. to raise funds for continuing and expanding services to crippled children and adults in Bryan. The campaign will continue through Easter Sunday, March 29.

The Easter Seal campaign is being conducted simultaneously by 1,700 state and local affiliates of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults located in the 49 state, District of Columbia, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Approximately 77 per cent of the funds remains in the country where raised to finance rehabilitation services for the area's crippled. The remainder helps support a national program of direct service, education and research.
