# Ag Nine Tries Rice Saturday; Freshmen Meet Owlets Here

The Aggie baseball squad hopes to regain its winning form Saturday when A&M travels to Houston to face the strong Rice Owls.

The two are currently tied for first place honors in the Southwest Conference baseball race with a 2-1 record. The Aggies won seven straight games before dropping the contest with the SMU Mustangs Wednesday in Dallas, 7-6.

Lanky Percy Sanderson is scheduled to toe the mound for the Farmers with relievers Larry Ayres and Wayne Schaper ready to step in if the senior should

weaken. Sanderson holds a 2-1 won-loss record and has pitched 22 innings of ball. Twelve runs have crossed the plate against him on 24 hits while Sanderson has struck out 17 and walked 11.

Sophomore Dick Hickerson is leading the Aggie sluggers with a nifty .417 percentage in the batting department. The strong southpaw has four doubles and two three-baggers to his credit and has knocked in seven runs.

Outfielder Clifford Davis trails Hickerson, the starting first baseman, with a .379 average in 29

trips to the batter's box. Davis' only extra base hits are two doubles.

At the catcher's position, batting .378, will be reliable Gary Herrington. The senior co-captain leads the team in doubles with five and is tied for the home run crown with Byron Barber with two apiece. Don Chase, Herrington's relief behind the plate, has a .364 average in 11 trips to the plate.

Windel Reed, all-SWC in 1957, holds down the third base position and is batting .333. Reed, having one of his best seasons to date at Aggieland, has four doubles and 18 RBI's to attest to his improved batting skill.

Junior Ralph Plumlee is reaching for the .300 group with a .286 average. Last season the play-making shortstop hit a meager .216. The other part of the keystone combination is Dink Patterson at second base. The combination has accounted for four double plays this season.

Barber, the stubby outfielder, is picking up his batting pace and has a .255 average with one double, triple and two homers to his credit while knocking in 22 runs, three behind Herrington.

Centerfielder J. B. Carroll has trotted to the plate 25 times and rapped off six hits for a .240 average. Filling out the outfield will be Lloyd Stone who is hitting a lowly .147. The senior right fielder has two doubles and four RBI's.

Back at College Station the Ag-

gie Fish will try to hit the comeback trail against the Rice Owlets. The freshmen dropped their first game of the season Wednesday against the Allen Academy Ramblers after winning their first four tilts.

Either Bill Vincent or Melvin Priddy could start for the frosh on the mound. Vincent and Priddy are both 2-0 for the season although Vincent left the Wednesday game with the score tied 1-1 to attend football practice.

# Texas Relays Opens Today; Weight Field Rated Strong

Although the big names of recent years will be missing, a good weight field seems assured for the 32nd annual Texas Relays Friday and Saturday.

Neither Al Oerter of Kansas nor John Fromm of Pacific Lutheran will be on hand this year. Oerter is defending champion in the shot and discus and Texas Relays record-holder in the discus, while Fromm was 1958 Texas Relays and NCAA javelin champion. His throw of 252-10 1/2 was a Relays record.

Nevertheless, outstanding competitors will be present to compete for shot, discus and javelin honors.

Heading the shot fields are Oklahoma Sooners Mike Lindsay and Dan Erwin and Texas' school-record-holding Jim Allison.

Lindsay, a sophomore from England, won the recent Big Eight indoor meet with a put of 58-4 1/2. Erwin, fourth in the 1958 Texas Relays, was runner-up in the indoor meet as well as in last year's Big Eight outdoor meet.

Allison, a sophomore, tossed the iron ball 53-8 last week at San Angelo for a Longhorn record.

In the discus, Russ Seitzinger of Hardin-Simmons, Bobby Weise of Houston and Texas' Alex Palmros are expected to set the pace.

Seitzinger let loose a 160-8 throw in the Southwestern Recreation Meet. Weise, fifth in the 1958 Relays, threw the platter 159-1 in this year's opening meet. Palmros, hampered early this season because of a broken jaw and a resulting liquid diet, is rounding into the form that gave him second place last year.

Other leading discus candidates are Owen Hill of A&M, Clyde Northrup of Oklahoma State and Lindsay.

Javelin competition is expected to headline Bruce Parker of Texas, Bill Alley and John Book of Kansas and Newton Lamb of A&M.

Jean Laussier plunged successfully over Niagara Falls in 1928. Where his competitors had used steel drums and similar devices, Laussier placed himself in a large rubber ball and bounced over the falls with little damage.

**ORDINANCE NO. 279**  
 AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING SIX-HOUR PARKING UPON BOTH SIDES OF BOYETT STREET BETWEEN FARM-TO-MARKET ROAD 60 AND CHURCH STREET IN THE CITY OF COLLEGE STATION, PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE City Council of the City of College Station that pursuant to authority under the charter of the city and the statutes of the State of Texas, the following regulations concerning parking on both sides of Boyett Street between Farm-to-Market Road 60 and Church Street are hereby fixed:

In the best interest of public safety, movement of traffic and for the general good of the public, the following parking areas are established:

A. Six-hour parking on both sides of Boyett Street between Farm-to-Market Road 60 and Church Street.

It is therefore ordered and ordained that such parking area be established and that appropriate signs be erected and that the proper authorities, after the due passing of this ordinance and erection of said signs, be instructed to enforce said ordinance, and that anyone violating said parking regulations be found guilty of a misdemeanor.
