New Building To Be Ready For Fall of '60

The new Petroleum Engineering Building is expected to be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1960, according to T. R. Spence, manager of the System Office of Phy-

Spence said the new building will be located directly east of the present Petroluem Engineering-Geology Building and will be on the same block.

The building is of the same general type of construction as the Dairy and Bio-Chemistry Building and has been planned by Ingram and Harris of Beaumont. It will be three stories high with concrete frame and masonry walls. At present the departments of

geology, chemical engineering and petroleum engineering are all located in the same building. The departments of geology and chemical engineering will utilize the space made available to them by moving the Department of Petroleum Engineering to the new build-


