Youth Problem Poll Set Forth by Daniel

Texas will have an opportunity to express their ideas about the problems of today's children and youth by filling out the Public Opinion Poll above.

Gov. Price Daniel, in cooperation with President Eisenhower's White House Conference on Children and Youth, has appointed interested citizens from throughout Texas to battle the problems of Texas children and youth.

The Texas Committee has decided to work through the local committees in determining the biggest problems facing Texas youth, and the first project is a poll of "grass root" opinion from people all over Texas.

Daniel said that the community is the battle ground in the fight against juvenile crime, the control center for public education and the

taproot of health and happiness for Texas children.

"Our purpose is not to go to Washington for someone to tell us what to do about our children," he said. "Rather, it is to generate public interest in how we in Texas can meet the needs and problems of our youngsters. Responsibility rests upon our homes, our churches and our schools to give training to qualify our children for citizenship.

The governor has asked that every Texan use time and thoughtful interest in expressing his ideas through this poll. The results will be tabulated and will represent Texas' demand for attention at the White House Conference.

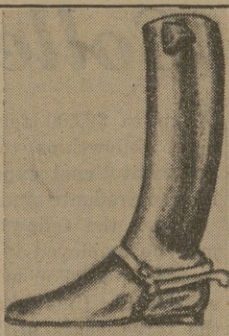

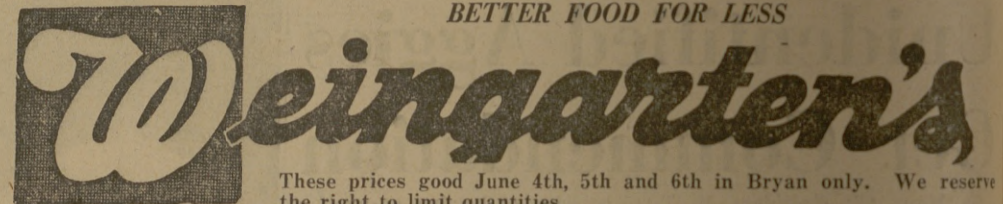
