Dr. D. F. Weekes Appointed Head Of College Physics

Dr. Donald F. Weekes, a long-time member of the physics faculty here, has been appointed acting head of the college's Department of Physics.

The head of the department, Dr. J. G. Potter, has been granted a 15-month leave of absence by the college for an assignment with the National Science Foundation in Washington, D. C.

Weekes has been associated with A&M since the fall of 1937 when he joined the faculty as a physics instructor. He has been a professor of physics since 1945.

During a two-year period in the early part of World War II, he was on leave of absence for a special assignment in radar research at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

He served for several years as a consultant to the Solid State Division of the Oak Ridge National Laboratory, and represents A&M on the Council of the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies.

A native of Massachusetts, Weekes received his B. S. degree from Middlebury College, Middlebury, Vt. in 1924, his M. A. degree from Amherst College, Amherst, Mass., in 1926 and his Ph. D. from Cornell University in 1937.

His work here has included both teaching and research with his present research interests being solid state physics and electro magnetic theory.

Ben H. Evans, head of the architectural research division of the Texas Engineering Experiment Station, left June 12 with Mrs. Evans for Brussels, Belgium, where he will attend the 4-year Congress of the International Commission on Illumination.
