W. B. Mansfield, who has moved to Houston, will work with these plants in determining training needs, establishing training schedules, training instructors and in upgrading their supervisory personnel through the supervisory development program offered by the Engineering Extension Service.

They include fundamentals of supervision, personnel relations, methods improvement, effective employe training, the supervisor and accident prevention, and industrial communication.
