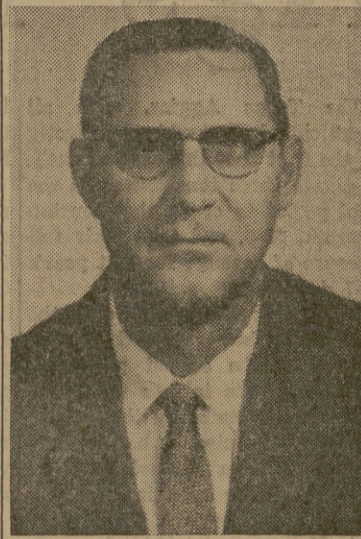
Guests of the club at the meeting were W. D. (Pete) Hardesty, Dr. Carl Landiss, the Rev. Earl Martin and Welch.

Kemler Joins Vet Medicine Teaching Staff

Dr. Arden Grant Kemler has joined A&M as associate professor in the School of Veterinary Medicine.

Kemler, formerly assistant professor at the University of Georgia, will be teaching veterinary anatomy. His special interest field is gross anatomy.

Born at Basehor, Kan., he obtained his doctor of veterinary medicine degree in 1950 from Kansas State University and his master of science degree in 1959 at the University of Georgia.

He followed general practice from 1950-54, after which he joined the University of Georgia. During World War II, Kemler was a 1 Lt. in the U. S. Air Force and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Purple Heart. He is a member of the American Veterinary Medical Assn.

Kemler, and his wife Charlotte, and three children, Vance, Ardis Ann and Jan Marie, live at 1608 Jersey St. in College Station.

Ag Programs Set To Help Freshmen

The A&M School of Agriculture this school year has launched a series of 13 programs and speech presentations designed to better enable freshmen students to select their field of study.

Dean of Agriculture G. M. Watkins said program speakers will include leaders in both general industry and agriculture.

"We are asking the students to attend these meetings in order to have a series of presentations by outstanding men in all phases of the huge agricultural industry," he said. "The industry is so large and changes so rapidly that rather few persons fully understand it."

The dean said some of the speakers will be rising young scientists in agriculture here who will relate basic biological and physical sciences to modern agriculture.

"As an outcome of this series, it is hoped that the boys can make their choices of fields of specialization from current information," Watkins said.

The first speaker of the fall

school session was Lloyd S. Larson of Kansas City, Mo., executive vice president of the Midwest Feed Manufacturers Assn. He discussed the feed making industry and its opportunities for college graduates.

The series is part of a student counseling service in technical agriculture, Watkins said. The boys formerly were handled by the Basic Division, a non-degree granting school established in 1950 to aid entering students in adjustment to college.

Judging Teams Enter Kansas Competition

A&M's senior meats and wool judging teams will leave Oct. 14 to compete in contests at Kansas City's annual American Royal Livestock Show, one of the largest in the nation.

Members of the meats team include Henry Fitzhugh of San Antonio, Don Osbourn of Valley Spring, Leroy Keese of Bandera and Joe Poyce of San Marcos.

Team Coach Frank A. Orts, research assistant in the Department of Animal Husbandry, said the group will hold practice judging sessions Oct. 14 at Armour and Co. in Fort Worth, Wilson and Co. Oct. 15-16 in Oklahoma City and at Swift and Co. Oct. 19 in Kansas City before the actual contest Oct. 20.

Orts said 20 or 25 teams from other colleges will compete in the event.

On the wool team are Lovell Kuykendall of Cherokee, Hudson Glimp of Burnet, John Hodge of Salado and Joe Joyce. Joyce also is a member of the senior livestock judging team, which already has left for the American Royal.

C. F. Parker, animal husbandry instructor and wool team coach, said a practice workout is scheduled Oct. 16 at Kansas City's Midwest Co-operative prior to the contest Oct. 18. About 8 teams will compete.

Parker said all members of the group have a grade point ratio of 2.0 or better.

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
