

Milstead - Meredith In Statistic Race

Charlie Milstead is running close behind league leading Don Meredith in total offense as the SWC statistics begin to stack up.

The third total offense position is held down by Jesse McGuire who has gained 6.6 yards per try to put him second in the leading ball carrier column.

In the punt return division the Aggies have three men in the top six. Milstead has averaged 14 yards per carry, Jon Few has averaged 13.7 yards and McGuire has run back three with a 11.7 yard average.

Last week's game helped Randy Sims pull into second place in pass receiving. His average gain per pass is 10.8 yards.

Milstead holds down second place in scoring with 18 points scored on three touchdowns. McGuire also enters into this column with 14 total points. He has scored two touchdowns and run one extra point.

A&M is third in total offense with 1007 yards. The Aggies boast a .590 per cent on passes completed and are second to Baylor who has .600.

The team conversion column is held down by Texas with eight points and the Cadets follow with seven on one run and five kicks.

Arkansas and Texas are undefeated in four games to hold the lead spot in the conference. A&M is third with three wins out of four games.

SMU has won two and lost one, Rice has lost two and tied one, Baylor has won one and lost two and TCU has won two and lost two.

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Milstead Second in Total Offense

Charley Milstead, the Aggies' big gun in their three straight wins over intersectional foes, is still running behind SMU's Don Meredith in the total offense department. Milstead has 378 yards total gain while the Mustang Ace boasts 411, but Milstead has 102 yards rushing to Meredith's meager 16.

Aggie-TCU Football Rivalry Has A&M Leading in Victories

When the Aggies and the TCU Frogs clash Saturday in Fort Worth it will be the 49th meeting between the two teams in rivalry that dates back to 1897. . . a 62 year span.

The Farmers hold the edge in the won-lost column with 29 wins against 15 defeats and five ties. The Froggies have won seven Southwest Conference championships during their tenure in the conference while the Aggies have copped the title eight and one half times, tying for the title in 1940 with the SMU Mustangs. The Frogs' last championship was in 1958 while the Aggies copped their

first title since 1940 in 1956 under Paul (Bear) Bryant.

A&M administered one of TCU's worst licks in the Frogs' history of football when they drubbed the Toads, 42-0, in 1906. TCU's heaviest margin of victory was 1938 when they downed the Cadets, 34-6.

The Frogs' all-time SWC mark of 108 victories, 80 defeats and 16 ties is topped by only the University of Texas. They have played in 10 Bowl games to lead the conference in that department. The Aggies have won 103 conference games, lost 105 and tied 22.

Ag Cross-Country Runners Beat TU

Coach Charley Thomas' Aggie Cross-country team, winners over Texas Longhorns last week, journey to Fort Worth Friday for a quadrangular meet with TCU, Texas and Baylor.

The Aggie varsity won over the Longhorns last week, 19-39 while the Fish defeated the Sho'rhorns, 29-20. Malcolm Hardee of Groveton, Freddie Duflock of Axtell and Thomas Johnston of Franklin swept the first three places in the varsity division while E. L. Ener of Jasper and Ronnie Dingle of Pinetree were one-two for the Fish.

Only other competition was a varsity loss to Houston and a frosh win over the Houston Kittens.
