



Dabbs is recognized as an authority on many phases of modern languages, notably Indo-European linguistics, Latin of exploration of Central Asia American history and translation and interpreting in the armed forces. Among the many articles | and books which he has had published are the following:

Dabbs joined the A&M faculty in 1950 as an assistant professor U. S. Army Reserve in the Department of Modern Languages and is now a professor in that department.

Dabbs was born on Jan. 31, 1914, in Mercury, Texas. He served in the Army during the 1940-48, serving as a military Local Army Reserve commanders government officer and attaining the rank of captain. He spent two years in Germany, and seven months in Korea.
