

Ags Hosts Rice Owls; Fish Meet Owlets at 6

The red hot Cadet cagers start their second round of conference play tomorrow night when they meet Rice in G. Rollie White Coliseum.

In first round play the Aggies bested the Owls, 61-43, which broke a seven year jinx held by the Owls. The last game was the first time the Cadets had been able to overcome the Owls since 1952.

The Ags will go into tomorrow's

contest with a 15-2 record for the season and 6-1 for conference play. Carroll Broussard, who scored 23 points against Arkansas, is the Cadets' leading scorer with 301 points to boast a 17.7 average. His average in conference play is 16.4.

Everybody Hits
The Aggies played a hot contest with the Razorbacks Tuesday night with five men hitting in the double figures. It was the second game in a row that this kind of scoring feat was accomplished.

For the season the Cadets are hitting 41.7 per cent of their shots from the floor. Their percentage was cut considerably on the West Coast trip, but in the last two games they have been finding the basket consistently.

Wayne Lawrence is still holding his own in free tosses with 81.5 per cent.

Rice is having its troubles this year, despite the efforts of Butch Craig, who is among the conference scoring leaders. Craig was high point man in the last Aggie-Rice tilt with 19 points.

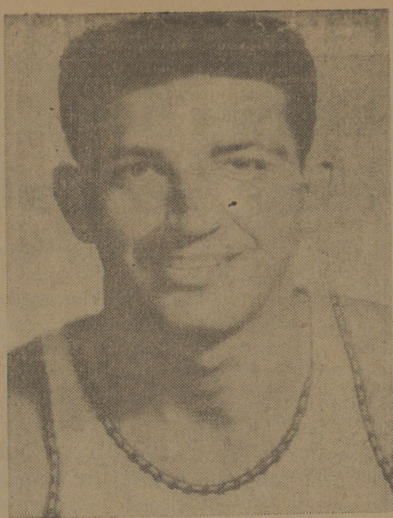
The Owls were downed by SMU Tuesday night to keep them in their cellar position and leave them with only one conference win against six losses.

Fish Ride High
Coach Shelby Metcalf's Young Aggies will take the court against the Owlets again tomorrow night after almost a month's layoff.

The Fish's last game was on Jan. 19 when they whipped the Owl-

ets 75-52. That was the game when all but four Rice players fouled out and Coach Metcalf finished the game with four Aggies.

The Fish boast a record of six wins and two losses and stand to have a very successful season. Their shooting percentage ranks close to the varsity's as they have hit 40.6 from the floor and 63.7 on free shots.

Consolidated Faces Two Tough Teams

The A&M Consolidated Tigers face a rough two game schedule of basketball this weekend and next week as the Bengals see action in their final two contests the games could mean either first, second or third place in District 21-AA standings.

The Tigers meet the third place Cy-Fair Bobcats Friday night in Cy-Fair before entertaining the Humble Wildcats in Tiger Gym on Tuesday. The Tigers are on the second rung of the 21-AA ladder, two games behind the front running Wildcats and a half game ahead of the Bobcats. A clean sweep by the Tigers plus an upset by the Bellville Brahmas over the Wildcats would give the Ben-

gals a share of the crown. Either a Tiger loss or a Humble win will give the 'Cats the title and two losses by the local Maroon and White would drop them into the third slot.

Coach Jack Churchill's tandem-post offense has worked to the tune of 15 wins and seven losses in the first year at A&M Consolidated. Bruce Thompson leads the scoring parade with 305 points in 22 tilts and Kelly Parker is next with 141 in a like number of contests.

Dominating the "B" teamers, who have run up a 12-7 record, is Bob Adams with 110 points in 17 games, while Harris Marshall has 95 and Danny Garner has 92.

Probable starters for the Maroon and White Friday night will include Thompson and Virden Smith at posts, Parker and Condy Pugh at the forward slots and P. D. Gandy at guard.

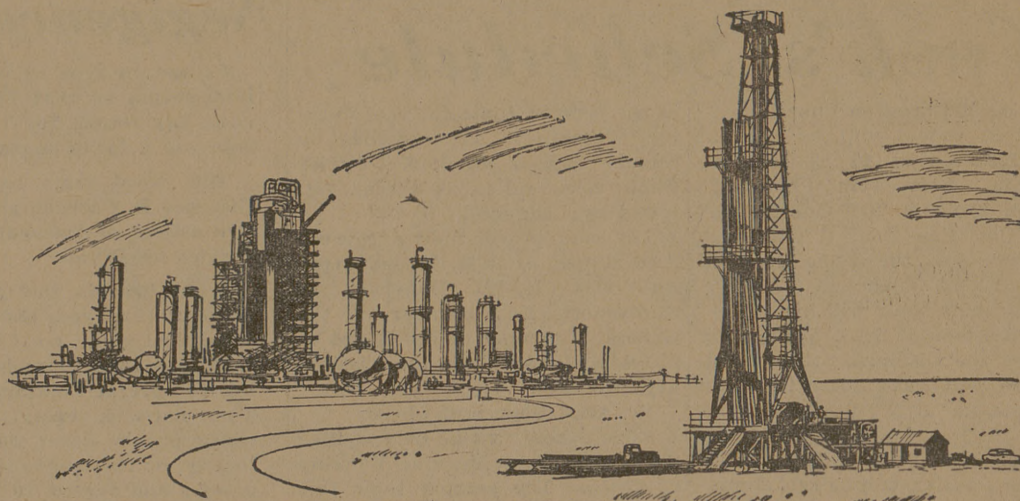
Cy-Fair will go with a five of Jim McDonald, Keith Bambrick, Ken Clark, Lawrence Kubiak, and Donnie Tyler.
