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



Less Gap Shown Between Outfits

With more men and fewer but larger organizations the Corps of Cadets grades remained the same for the 1959-60, fall semester as for the same period last year, according to figures released by Kenneth R. McGee, Corps scholastic of-

The overall grade point ratio for the Corps for the fall semester was set at 1.38, identical to last year's figure. The 1958-59 fall semester 1.38 was higher than the 1,282 for the 1957-58 fall semester. More Than Last Year

McGee's, figures showed there were 3,545 cadets who finished the fall semester against 2,872 who completed the semester last year.


