Again, But...

The possibility of Texas A&M having coeds in the future received its biggest boost ever in the opinion given yesterday by the 10th Court of Civil Appeals.

The court again stopped the admission of women into the all-male college, but declared that a Bryan woman should be allowed to attend Texas A&M if she seeks a course in floriculture leading to a degree. The basis of this opinion came from the fact that Texas A&M is the only state supported school offering a degree in the course she sought.

There may be more to the opinion than meets the eye, however, as the coed issue has been progressing favorably in the direction of their admission during the past year. Despite the arguments that Texas A&M is an all-male college, operated under military rules, the chances of admitting women to the institution are still in a position of going either way. Still the recent decisions of the courts have been somewhat toward the admission of coeds, as evidenced particularly yesterday.

This decision could be another in the slow process of eventually admitting coeds to the 84-year-old all-male col-




