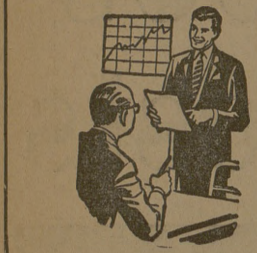

TTI Research Work Printed By Government

"A Study of Freeway Traffic Operation" by Charles J. Keese, Charles Pinnell and William R. McCasland, researchers here, has been reprinted from Bulletin 235 of the Highway Research Board, Washington, D. C. It covers research of the Texas Transportation Institute and reveals that design and use of ramps and interchanges have greatest effect on freeway operation. It points out also that entering traffic along the freeway has an obvious influence on traffic across all parallel unseparated lanes and that high-speed express lanes are needed for accommodating longer freeway trips without interference. The article stresses also that the outer roadway involving the relatively frequent points of access and egress is necessary to efficiently integrate the freeway with the existing street pattern and to assure greater utilization of the facility during off-peak as well as peak periods.

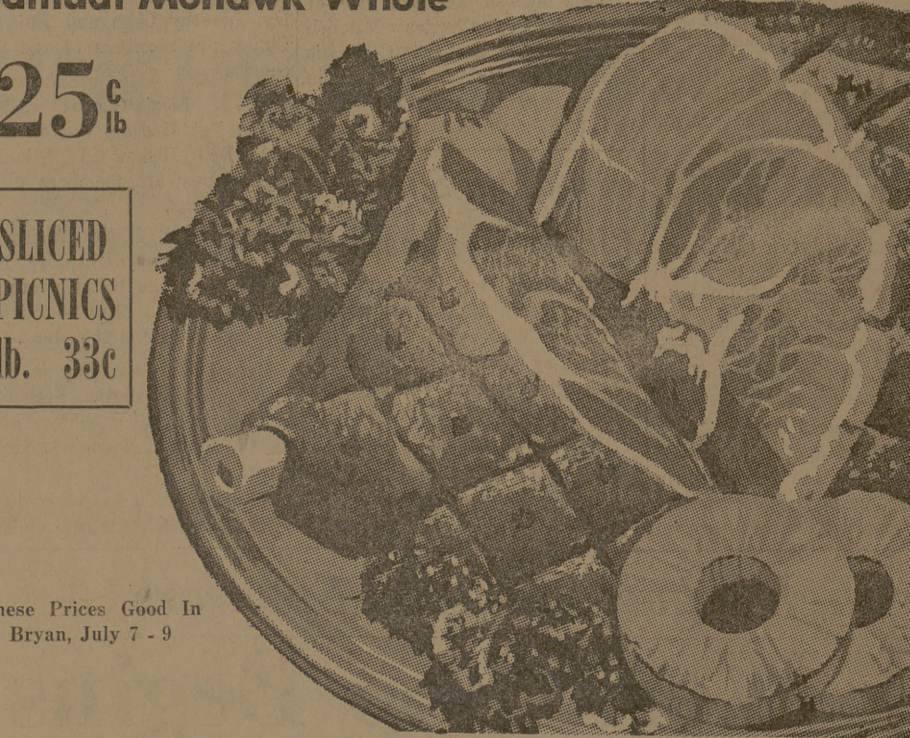
