# Eight Faculty Men Plan August Trips

Eight members of the Department of Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology will participate in out-of-state conferences during August.

They are A. B. Wooten, associate professor; John G. McNeely, professor; Clarence A. Moore, associate professor; Bardin A. Nelson, professor; Henry Courtenay, assistant professor; R. L. Skrabanek, professor; A. D. Jones, agricultural economist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture; and Lloyd Bergsma, farm management specialist.

Wooten will participate in the Western Resources Conference Aug. 21 at the University of Colorado, a session to discuss procedures in evaluating water development projects. McNeely will serve as chairman of the Livestock Marketing Section of the annual meeting of the Western Farm Economics Assn., Aug. 24-26 at Stanford University.

A paper entitled "Decision Making Processes in Farmer Co-Operatives" will be presented by Moore at the Co-Operative Research Workshop Aug. 4-10 at the University of California. He also will take part in the annual meeting of the American Institute of Co-Operation on the same dates at the university.

Nelson, Courtenay and Skrabanek will attend the annual meeting Aug. 25-27 of the Rural Sociological Society at Pennsylvania State University.

Nelson will present a paper entitled "Response Variations Occurring in the Use of Different Techniques" and Courtenay will talk on "An Analysis of Response Variation Encountered When Selected Interviewing Techniques Are Used in Consumer Market Research." Skrabanek will serve as chairman of the Rural Education Section.

Jones will represent the USDA Agricultural Marketing Service at the Western Regional Wool Marketing Technical Committee meeting Aug. 3-5 at Corvallis, Ore. He will remain in the western states for an extended period to obtain information on wool-scouring operations and wool flow patterns, including modes of transportation.

Bergsma will represent the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at the 1961 Western Livestock and Feed Outlook Conference Aug. 2-3

The course will emphasize commercial feeding practices and the use of a new grading system. Shepard has been in the feeding business for 20 years.

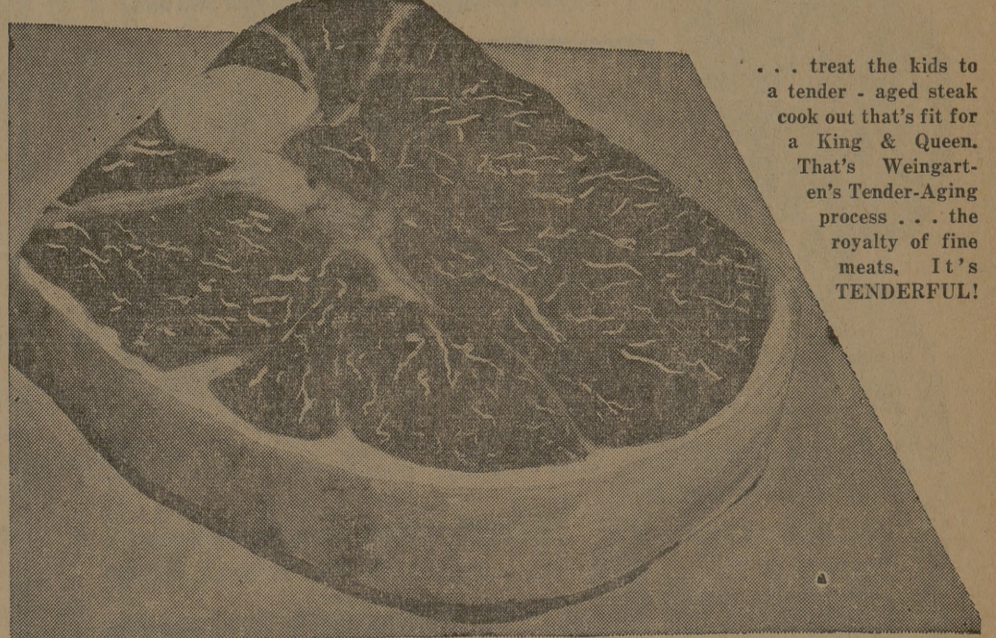
