Probably the brightest spot in this year's freshmen is the fine crop of backs. During last spring's recruiting Coach Jim Myers said that he had three of the top backs in the state. He was speaking of Jim Linnstaedter of Brenham, Jerry Rogers of Corpus Christi and Travis Reagan of Wichita Falls.

Among the top linemen are end Kenneth Bode of Brady, center Ray Kubala from West and Bobby Evans of Thorndale.

Coach Hughes is beginning his first season as freshman coach. Before coming to A&M last spring, Hughes racked-up an impressive record at Deer Park High School where his teams lost but one district game in eight years.

However, Hagler's ankle injury fails to respond by Friday, Jim McAfee, sop 150-pounder could run in his spot or Pugh could switch to fullback and Russell Welch, 155 junior, could run the ball club from quarterback Pugh ran well from fullback against Madisonville and McAfee chipped in with the winning TD.

## Two Consolidated Teams To See Action This Week

The A&M Consolidated Tigers' two gridiron elevens see full action this week as the varsity Bengal's journey to Giddings Friday and the "B" team Maroon and White treks to Navasota tonight.

The "B" squad, composed of freshmen, sophomores and a sprinkling of juniors, will be out to revenge their older brothers' 16-0 defeat at the hands of the Rattlers in the two clubs' season opener. The Tiger "B" eleven has dropped its only decision this year, a 29-6 to the predominantly junior-senior "B" squad from Huntsville.

Coaches George Johnston and Art Bright will open with five sophomores, three juniors and three freshmen in an attempt to send the win column. Sophs Mike Callihan and Don Duncan will man the terminals, juniors Tommy Hughes and Tommy Taylor will be the tackles, sophs Mike Robison and Sid Coufal will hold down the guard slots and fish Bill White will be over the ball.

In the Tiger backfield freshman signal-caller Jay Pewthers will run the club while freshman Bob Wright and junior varsity squad-man Irvin Todd will run at the halves, and soph Rick Owen will run from fullback. Johnny Krenitky, Byron Pruitt and Sidney Atwater will also see plenty of action. Todd has been relegated to the "B" squad after failing to meet scholastic requirements.

In the main attraction the varsity Bengals will attempt to make it two in a row against the 20-AA Buffaloes in Giddings.

Things look bad, title-wise for the Buffs, playing in the same conference with the Taylor Ducks, rated number two in the preseason AA ratings. Elgin, moving up from class A, and Georgetown, with 11 lettermen could also cause the Bengals plenty of trouble while Round Rock is dubbed to occupy the cellar, having only six lettermen returns.

Defense has been the order of the week for Coach Ed Logan's Tigers, as the Madisonville Mustangs racked up 295 yards total offense against the Bengals last week. With three game totals now available, Tiger foes have racked up 202 yards per game on the ground and 66 yards per tilt on the air.
